The National Finances.

And unless something is done for the public relief, and that speedily, the policy of repudiation, be imperatively demanded by every one but

That there is a great change in the system of education is manifest to all. The age in which we live is a practical one, that is to say, an age of scientific culture and intellectual mediocrity. And education must submit to the necessity of becoming practical also.
