## How the President Feels.

The Washington correspondent of the Boston Post, writing under date of May 10, says The Washington correspondent of the Boston Post, writing under date of May 10, says:

The probable result of the great impeachment trial is the universal topic of conversation in all circles of society here and elsewhere, but the great wonder so frequently expressed is: "How does President Johnson feel; what does he think of the chances of conviction or acquittal?" To gratify this very natural curicity or wonder on the part of the people, your correspondent sought information at the executive mansion, where he was cordially received by the President, who, with perfect monchalance, inquired "What news to-day; how stands impeachment?" No one could have suspected that the party who propounded these questions was himself the party impeached, and then on trial for "high crimes and misdemeanors." Mr. Johnson has never looked better than he does to-lay, and his fine flow of good humor indicates anything but a troubled mind. After briefly replying to his questions, your correspondent ventured upon his work directly and without circumlocution. "I would be pleased to learn your views of the situation, Mr. President; what do you think of impeachment?"

The President promptly replied: "Oh, I have never allowed myself to believe or feel that the American Senate would prostitute its great power of impeachment to base party purposes, and I shall not believe it until I know the vote of conviction has been recorded. Such is my abstract opinion of the Senate; but whatever

When the doors were closed the Chief Justice stated that, in compliance with the desire of the Senate, he had prepared the questions to be addressed to senators upon each article of impeacement, and that he had reduced his

impeachment, and that he had reduced his views thereon to writing.

On motion of Senator Buckalew, the views of the Chief Justice were ordered to be entered on the journal of proceedings, as follows:

Senators—In conformity with what seemed to be the general wish of the Senate when it adjourned last Thursday, the Chief Justice, in taking the vote on the articles of impeachment, will adopt the mode sanctioned by the practice in the case of Chase, Peck and Humphreys.

He will direct the secretary to read the seve-

Chase:

"Mr. Senator—, how say you, is the respondent, Andrew Johnson, President of the United States, guilty or not guilty of a high misdemeanor, as charged in this article?"

In putting the questions on articles four and six, each of which charges a crime, the word "crime" will be substituted for the word "misdemeanor."

The Chief Justice has carefully considered

March 2, 1867, and also to prevent the execution of the rebel State governments act of the same date.

The gravamen of the article seems to be that the President attempted to defeat the execution of the Tenure-of-office act, and that he did this in pursuance of a declaration which was intended to deny the constitutional competency of Congress to enact laws or propose constitutional amendments, and by contriving means to prevent Mr. Stanton from resuming his office of Secretary, and also to prevent the execution of the Appropriation act and the vebel State government acts.

The simple substantive matter charged is the attempt to prevent the execution of the Tenure-of-office act, and the other facts alleged either as introductory and exhibiting this general purpose, or as showing the means contrived in furtherance of that attempt.

This sincle matter, connected with the other matters previously and subsequently alleged, is charged as the high misdemeanor of waich the President is alleged to have been guilty.

The general question, guilty or not guilty of a high misdemeanor as charged, seems fully to cover the whole charge, and will be put as to this article as well as to the others, unless the Senate directs some mode of division.
