The Omnibus Bill.

The following is a copy of the bill passed by the House of Representatives on Thursday, and by virtue of which it is expected that the Carolinas and the Gulf States will be carried comfortably back into the Union:

▲ BILL to admit the States of North Carolins, South Carolins, Louisiana, Georgia and Alabama to representation in Congress.

Carolina, Louisiana, Georgia and Alabama have, in pursuance of the provisions of an act entitled "An act for the more efficient government of the rebel States," passed March 2, 1867, and the acts supplementary thereto, framed constitutions of State government which are republican in form, and have adopted said constitutions by large majorities of the votes cast at the elections held for the ratification or rejection of the same: Therefore,

But enacted by the Benate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the States of North Carolina, South Carolina, Louisiana, Georgia, and Alabama shall be entitled and admitted to representation in Congress as States of the

Carolina, South Carolina, Louisiana, Georgia, and Alabama shall be entitled and admitted to representation in Congress as States of the Union when the Legislatures of said States respectively shall have duly ratified the amendment to the Constitution of the United States proposed by the Thirty-ninth Congress, and known as article fourbeen, upon the following fundamental conditions: That the constitutions of said States shall never be amended or changed so as to discriminate in favor of or against any citizans or class of citizens of the United States in their right to vote who are now entitled to vote by said constitutions respectively, except as a punishment for such crimes as are now felonies at common law, whereof they shall have been duly convicted; and no person shall ever be held to service or labor as a punishment for crime in said States, except by public officers charged with the custody of convicts by the laws thereof; and that so much of the constitution of the State of Georgia as gives authority to Legislatures or courts to repudiate debts contracted prior to the first day of June, 1865, and similar provisions in all other of the constitutions mentioned in this bill, shall be null and void as against all men who were legal during the whole time of the rebellion, and who, during that time, support-

other of the constitutions mentioned in this bill, shall be null and void as against all men who were leval during the whole time of the rebellion, and who, during that time, supported the Union; and they shall have the same rights in the courts and elsewhere as if no rebellion had ever existed.

SEC. 2. And be it further enacted, That if the day fixed for the meeting of the Legislature of either of said States by the constitution thereof, shall have passed before the passage of this act, such Legislature may be convened within thirty days after the passage of this act by the president of the convention which framed the constitution of such State.

SEC. 3. And be it further enacted. That the first section of this act shall take effect when the President of the United States shall officially proclaim the due ratification by the Legislatures of said States respectively of article fourteen of the amendments to the Constitution of the United States, proposed by the Thirty-ninth Congress. And it is hereby made the duty of the President, within ten days after receiving official information of the ratification of said amendment by the Legislatures of either of said States, to assue a proclamation announcing that fact.
