Gold closed steady at New York yesterday, and was quoted at 39 3/4.

The New York cotton market was a shade lower; sales 800 bales at 14.

At Liverpool the cotton market was irregular, and closed at a decline of 1/4 per lb., upland 12 1/2; Orleans 12 1/4.

The "Cellarist" is rivaling the "German" in New York.

The Pall Mall Gazette says the capture of Magdala "has been less a feat of arms than a feat of legs and head."

Senator Henderson, they say, is to marry Miss Poole, a Washington belle, and daughter of the Commissioner of Patents.

Grand has been betting cigars with Stanton about the President's continuance in office. Stanton is preparing to be "sucked out."

The cotton lands along the Illinois River are submerged. The river is fifteen feet above low water mark.

Heller is in London with a new trick which he calls the "girl of the period." He throws a young woman of that sort, aged sixteen, out of a hat.

A freeman on the New York Central Railroad has repeated the heroic act of catching a child off the track in front of the locomotive and saving its life.

The "Blush of Poesia" is about to publish a "green book." Edgell will soon be the only government without a diplomatic volume of some color.

Dr. Nolston, the French surgeon, is going to Sweden to operate on a tumored nobleman. There the doctor's fees is to be \$20,000, and his traveling expenses will be paid.

Artificial babies are advertised in France, for travellers' use, warranted to scream with such effect as to deter any individual from entering the compartment of the railway carriage where one may be.

It is now stated on good authority that Chief Justice Chase has positively decided to proceed with the trial of Jefferson Davis on the 30th of June. The United States Circuit Court has adjourned to that date.

All fortresses in Northern Germany will henceforth be connected by a line of telegraphic wires; in fact, they are already laid through Mayence, Coblenz, Cologne, and the Rhine fortresses.

In Paris the tariff of rates for transmitting telegrams from one part of the city to another is to be reduced. At present a message of twenty words costs ten cents, but by the new tariff it will be sent for five cents.

A man in Clinton Mass., who recently had the wrong finger for a surgical operation, has presented the greatly modified, christened and christened doctors with a little bill of fifteen hundred dollars damages, and has brought a suit to recover the same.

Professor Bolkow, an eminent scholar and professor of Oxford, asserts that the domestic "cat" of the present generation is not the animal now known by that name, but the marten of Europe, an animal allied to the American Pine Marten, or Sable, but larger.

A tablet, in memory of the late Thomas D'Arcy McGee, has been placed opposite the spot where he was killed. The inscription, cut on the stone, reads: "Here fell, on the 7th of April, 1862, by the assassin's hand, the Hon. Thomas D'Arcy McGee."

A French naturalist asserts that the trunks of trees are always flattened in the northerly and southerly direction, and expand in an east and west place, and these facts he connects directly with the movements in rotation of the earth.

In Nicaragua complaints are being made against the payment of an annual tribute to England in the shape of debt interest and other dues. The people seem to have an idea that if they resist payment the United States will endorse their refusal, and protect them against British reprisals.

Prince Edward Island still holds aloof from the Canadian Dominion, and her people are said to have expressed great gratification at having kept out of it, now that the great discontent of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick at the restrictions placed upon them by the Dominion is so apparent.

Twenty-six thousand cases, or 1,500,000 pairs of shoes, were shipped from Lynn, Mass., during April. The value of these shipments was nearly \$2,000,000, and it was the largest month's business ever transacted at Lynn. The manufacturers are reported to be as busy as ever this month in filling orders.

The committee appointed by the recent Democratic meeting in favor of General Hancock for President, to wait on Governor Seymour, have just returned from Utica, having had an interview with that gentleman. They say he will under no circumstances be a candidate, and that they are at liberty to publish the fact.

A curious method of killing rats is recommended in a German journal as very efficient. A piece of new or unused sponge is cut into small pieces, which are smeared with butter, and placed within reach of the rats, next to a dish of water. The rats eat the sponge, and becoming thirsty, drink the water, which swells the sponge, and in a short time kills the animals, which are found lying dead all around.

Two singular, and not very young maiden ladies of New York City, are now fattening against each other for a wager. One takes cherry and eggs in the early morning, and the other trains on chocolate. Tripe is the pabulum selected by the former for dinner, while the latter devotes her masticatory powers to fish, and especially shad roes, which are said to be very promotive of adiposity. One hundred and fifty pounds is the weight aimed at.

The census of the German States, taken December 3d, 1862, gives to the North German Confederation a population of 29,894,857, and to the Southern States within the Zollverein a population of 8,602,487, making a total of 38,497,344. The census of 1854 of the States now forming the North German Confederation gave

a population of 29,890,000, and the Bund, anticipating an increase in three years, which would bring the number of inhabitants up to 50,100,000, asked and obtained from the first Reichsrath an appropriation for an army of 300,000 men, or one per cent. of the estimated population as prescribed by the constitution. Though the infantry regiments were numbered from 1 to 109, three were not organized, but were to be filled up after the census had been taken. As the returns show a falling off of 105,143 from the estimated population, the opposition newspapers demand a corresponding diminution of the army of 1051 men and a re-estimation of 286,476. The New Democratic Platform.

GEORGE WILKES, the editor of "Wilkes' Spirit," has been in Washington for some weeks past, and is deep in the plots and counter-plots of the politicians. The following extract from the leading editorial in the last issue of his paper is evidently from his pen, and in view of the recent developments at Washington, possesses peculiar significance:

"We know what we speak of, and we say authoritatively that the Democratic platform will be so amended as to recognize the national progress of the last seven years, and to suit the progressive temper of the time. On the fourth of July next that programme will be enunciated in Tammany Hall, in the City of New York. Its main plank will be a denunciation of the principle of human slavery, and an acceptance of all the legislation of the period on that subject; the repudiation and extinction of the Confederate debt; the equality of all men before the law; and impartial suffrage. It is shrewdly calculated that in view of such a programme, the alienated Democratic element, which now constitutes the Republican majority, having become disgusted with a party which is incapable of government, or even of defending its own life, and perceiving, moreover, in other and vigorous hands, a platform covering their old principles, will at once flock to the new standard, and leave the Republican party to sink in ruin. This is a plausible conception, and will be sure to win if ANDREW JOHNSON is acquiescent; though it is not so certain that the Democratic party, after having profited by the treachery of — FRANKLIN & Co., will choose to win with Republican traitors at its head."

"Recognizing the national progress of the last seven years" means a final surrender of the Southern States to the behests of Radicalism. We shall see.
