OUR EUROPEAN DISPATCHES.

THE CASE OF PRINCE ALFRED.—EXECUTION OF THE ASSASSIN.—THE FINAL RESULT STILL IN DOUBT.—INTENTIONS OF THE MANAGERS.

The excitement at Washington regarding the impeachment continues to abate, although the contest for the votes of doubtful senators on the second article is still waged, and there is renewed confidence among the impeachers that this article may yet be carried, but the ground of such confidence does not well appear. Some of the managers are confident that the investigations in which they are engaged will greatly help their case, but the calm and more dispassionate members of the committee do not agree with them. Should corruption be proved, a new article will be presented and the managers will say that the case be purged. The National Intelligencer says:

The managers are said to be much at fault with course to pursue in respect to impeachment. It is said that General Butler is sure to be elected, but the present order of the Senate, with a view to separate the impeachment from the non-impeachment vote. Others advocate a postponement of the impeachment until the next session, when the Senate will be more numerous and the public mind more settled.

OUR WASHINGTON DISPATCHES. GRANT SPEARS A THIRD TIME FOR PRESIDENT.—CONGRESSIONAL—EXTRACTS OF TELEGRAMS. ad. WASHINGTON, May 23.—Nom. Gen. Grant was re-elected for a third time, and in response to public speaking, and without any desire to cultivate that power [laughter], it is impossible for me to find appropriate language to thank you for this demonstration. All that I can say is that, whatever position I may be called by your will, I shall endeavor to discharge my duties with fidelity and honesty. Of my purpose, as my recitade in the performance of public duties, you will have to judge for yourselves by my record before you.

The House was called to order and immediately adjourned. Both Houses will meet on Monday. Revenues for the week, \$3,204,000. A majority of the managers disapprove of the article. No authentic is known as to the course events will take to-morrow and Tuesday. In fact it is doubtful whether the Radical leaders themselves have yet fixed upon a policy. As things stand, the indications are in favor of a further postponement of the final vote.

NEWS FROM TEXAS AND MISSISSIPPI. GALVESTON, May 23.—A destructive hail storm occurred at San Antonio on the 18th. In half an hour it destroyed houses, crops, fruits and gardens to the extent of \$300,000. Several lives are reported to have been lost.

Gen. Basque, Santa Anna's agent, is still at Brownsville. Jeremiah Black is arguing the bridge case before Judge Watrous.

Quirros is reported at Laredo, Texas, with a force for the purpose of invading the State of Nueva Leon, with revolutionary intent.

Religious Intelligence. ALBANY, May 23.—The Presbyterian General Assembly (Old School) assembled to-day, Rev. James Williams (colored), of the Knox Presbytery of Georgia, was admitted to a seat.

BALTIMORE, May 23.—The Presbyterian Conference, responding to an invitation to hold its next conference in Louisville, passed a resolution on the expediency of holding the conference outside its own jurisdiction. The next conference occurs in Mobile. Rev. John C. Lyon, aged 67 years, and for forty years a minister, and founder of the German Methodist Church in America, is dead.

Strange Phenomenon in Florida. AGUACUA, May 23.—A few days ago nearly two acres of land on a farm in Hamilton county, Florida, suddenly sunk to a depth of fifty feet from the surface surrounding—the ground filling with water and submerging the tallest trees. The ground is still sinking and now covers four acres. The streams and creeks lose themselves in the surrounding country, which forced an outlet in this way. Those who sink occur occasionally, but this is the largest and deepest known.

A Bold Villain. CINCINNATI, May 23.—Robbers seized the engine between Louisville and Cincinnati, and detaching the express car left the balance of the train. They threw the express messenger out of his car and robbed three safes. The loss is unknown. The engine was found on the track this morning, deserted.

LATER.—It has been ascertained that the robbers secured at least \$40,000 by their operations.

The School Question in Louisiana. NEW ORLEANS, May 23.—The School Board are examining into the alleged presence of twenty-eight colored pupils in the white schools of the second district. The probability is they will be required to attend schools provided exclusively for colored persons, if found to be such.

Quarantine at New Orleans. NEW ORLEANS, May 24.—A quarantine has been established here against all the ports of Nicaragua and Central America, and the port of Vera Cruz.

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THE COTTON SUPPLY.

How much cotton remains in the country? The stocks held by manufacturers would supply their consumption at a full rate for periods varying from four weeks to five months, averaging about up to July 15. The rate has been reduced and is reducing weekly. If now 14,000 bales per week and soon to be 12,000 or less, the stocks in hand can be made to extend to August 12, or a later average. A supply of old cotton is required with which to run up to October 15, say thirteen weeks if from July 15, or nine weeks if from August 12. For thirteen weeks at 15,000 bales per week, 195,000 bales or for nine weeks at 13,000, 117,000, of which quantities the latter is likely to exceed the requirements up to the incoming of new crop cotton. To supply it, there are stocks (on hand and on shipboard) in markets—

Leaving stocks in markets Oct. 15.....108,000 bales. As no one will wish to hold old cotton for competition with the new crop coming in, these 108,000 bales, or the greater part of them, will have been pushed off upon either spinners at home or exporters, unless the growing crop to indicate short supply and high prices later on.

We have already cleared—Exports to Great Britain.....1,176,000. Exports to other countries.....1,560,000 bales. And have allowed also a further export of.....100,000 bales. Making a total of.....1,660,000 bales which includes a total to Great Britain.....1,200,000. And to the Continent.....460,000. Both of which are in excess of any estimate recently made of their supplies from our crop of 1867, and with other cotton that will reach Europe, will afford an ample supply and the usual surplus at the end of this year.

It has been shown that the quantity required for home use up to October 15 will be between 117,000 bales and 195,000 bales, according to the rate of use. Every one can take his own view of this rate under the very deterring circumstances which are now presented to manufacturers. The minimum quantity, 117,000 bales, has been allowed for. The stock then to remain, 108,000 bales, would supply enough to make good the possible maximum quantity of cotton to be sent to the ports quite as much as dealers will be willing to hold for the chances of market after October 15.

It is unwise to ignore either the fact that the surplus of cotton will be very small on the one hand, or on the other, that there always has been and always must be a surplus, or the further truth that the surplus is inevitably enlarged by too high prices.
