At Ward 4 two highly colored voters allowed their feelings to get the better of them, and they argued the political qualifications of their candidates loudly. One, a Massachusetts negro, was a Conservative and a Steward man; the other, a South Carolina dicker, was very Republican, and strong for Mackey. Words led to blows, and the parties clinched and fought in the most approved style. Conversation, however, carried the day, and the Mackey man was beaten until he cried piteous.

THE ELECTION.—Contrary to the expectation both of the civil and military authorities, the election in the city yesterday was unmarked by any disturbance worthy of notice. At nine o'clock last evening not more than ten arrests were reported as the result of the day's watchfulness, and these were made on the principle that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure, rather than as a punishment for a vicious disturbance of the peace.

The principal localities of excitement were the Washington Engine House in Ward 6, and the Court-house in Ward 2. In both of these places there was a jury contest in the early part of the day, but by judicious management on the part of the police, the excitement was quelled before blows were passed, and our reporter was unable to record a bloody nose or a broken head.

It was not known to the community at large, that, as a measure of precaution, Col. Bonford, the Commandant of the Post, had quietly, in squads of two's and three's, congregated a force of men in such localities as seemed likely to breed the greatest disturbance. With the exception of these passing demonstrations not a bayonet was to be seen during the day. At an early hour it was ascertained that much of the worthy contention around the polls was caused by ignorant and officious persons, who assent to be deputed for the managers upon the plea of their political views. To put a stop to this, Col. Cogswell authorized the appointment of three challengers in behalf of the respective candidates, with instructions to abide by the decisions of the managers in all cases, and instructions to the police to enforce the same without fear or favor. This arrangement very quickly quelled all symptoms of disturbance, and those who were ready for a row were compelled to ignominiously subside, or accept the alternative of a bank in the guard-house.

The amount of whiskey consumed yesterday was wonderful. Where it came from or by whom it was dispensed are secrets known only to the initiated; but it is told in hundreds of fumbled faces, and in eyes in noisy ejaculations, and in a general feeling of pleasure by all who indulge in the habit of smoking.

Mr. E. W. M. Mackey visited the upper wards frequently, but seemed particularly attached to the Eagle Engine House, where many of his constituents were gathered. His heart, no doubt, warmed at the sight of the faithful few, and, loosening his purse strings, he invested in pinheads and treated the crowd. The dusky voters munched the nuts, but kept their counsel and voted as they thought best.

Towards dinner time the crowd of voters dwindled somewhat, and the hard-worked managers were allowed time to moisten their clay and demolish the crackers and cheese furnished by the candidates. The heaviest voting was done in the morning, and few persons came forward after 2 o'clock.

The results in the city are given below. The results in the wards are not known, but rumors are that the Rev. Christ Church Parish and Wadmalaw Island that a raid was made upon the ballot-box, and they were destroyed by the friends of the Radical nominee. Similar demonstrations are said to have been made at the churches of St. John's and St. Peter's, where Captain Sigwald is understood to be ahead. A man is said to have been shot in Berkeley District, but of the circumstances we know nothing.

On the whole, we may congratulate ourselves that an occasion of so much excitement between the races has passed without trouble, and that whoever has been elected will not sit on chairs whose doorposts have been stained with blood.

After 6 P. M. the managers declared the polls closed, and proceeded to count the votes. There was no opposition to the Radical ticket in the case of any office but that of Sheriff, and the votes were counted carefully, showing the following result:

The returns from the country have not been received, but they will hardly affect the result given in the city. One precinct in Berkeley District, known as the 16-Mile Church, polled 219 votes for Mackey and two for Hastie.
