GRAIN.—The demand has rather improved, but prices remain without important alteration. We quote prime shoulders at 10c 1/2 lb; prime rib sides at 11c 1/2 lb, and prime clear rib sides at 18c 1/2 lb.

BAIT.—Holders, from store, are asking \$1.70 @ 1.80 per sack.

FRUITS.—To most prices are dull and nominal. To Liverpool, 1/4 on upland and 1/2 on sea islands. To Havana nominal, and \$2 @ 3 M on India but little offering at \$7 @ 8 gold, and \$10 @ 11 M lumber, for north side of Cuba, and \$2 @ 3 M for south side, with the privilege of changing gold to coin.
