The Democratic Platform.

We print this morning the platform of the National Democratic Convention - a platform whose plain, manly and earnest language upon the great questions of the day contrasts happily with the double-faced, shuffling Republican resolutions lately adopted in Chicago.

It was feared that the Democracy of the nation would be tempted to prefer expediency to far-seeing statesmanship; but the delegates of North and South, East and West, have been worthy of their ancient fame, and speak at last in earnest, hearty tones that carry with them the assurance to Denmark against the practice of sending of confidence and victory. Upon the subject of taxation, upon the subject of the tariff, upon the subject of the right of suffrage, their words cannot be misunderstood, and their declaration that the monstrous Reconstruction acts are unconstitutional and void will cause every Southern man, every lover of republican liberty, to calist his whole strength in the cause of the National Democracy. Their cause is our cause, our cause is theirs; but we may well be grateful to Providence that the party which represents the honesty, the intelligence and the wealth of the nation. has explicitly and unreservedly taken RIGHT AND CONSTITUTIONAL FREEDOM 88 its motto, and has given us a war-cry that shall send a thrill of terror to the heart of every Radical in the land.

The Message of Governor Orr.

The message of Governor ORR to the State Legislature, published this morning, is one of the most able documents ever submitted to this people, and with the accompanying reports and statements, exhibits, in a clear and comprehensible manner, the present condition of the different departments of the government.

In his recommendations Governor ORR is frank and plain, and he has evidently been prompted by a proper desire to render a faithful account of his stewardship, while, at the same time, he points out to the inexperienced legislators who temporarily direct our affairs the shoals upon which they are most likely to be wrecked. The views of Governor Our concerning taxation are reasonable and just, but it will be a shock to Republican property holders to learn that the late convention absorbed \$110,000; that the sitting Legislature will cost about 7th rebellion. The South is the victim of a \$140,000; that the city and county jurors, under the new constitution, will cost \$99,ished and 000 against \$42,000 under the old plan; State in the coming year, including the Legislature, the deficit for this year under General CANBY's order, and the interest on the State debt due October, 1868, will be no less than \$1,057,688, without one dollar being appropriated for free schools.

Governor Onn advises a State loan, denies the State liability for the notes of the Bank of the State, urges that the Legislature take measures for defeating the attempt of persons representing a small portion of the bonds of the Greenville and Columbia Railroad to sell the road to the prejudice of the State and all other creditors, and warmly advises immediate action for securing the completion of the Blue Ridge

Governor One explains the position of the Penitentiary and Lunatic Asylum, and passes to the University, which he recommends shall be appropriated exclusively to the whites, while the Citadel, in Charleston, may be converted into an educational institution for the colored people. White immigration, he says, should be encouraged by all available means within the command of the Legislature and the people. It is recommended that the State House be comthe Governor or his pay be increased. The codification of the criminal law and the adoption of a uniform system of punishment for crime and the restriction of the death penalty to murder and arson and other crimes of the greatest gravity, are recommended. The Governor offers more valuable advice as to the responsibility of sheriffs, the sale of land for taxes and the selection of juries. He has no doubt as to the constitutionality of the homestead exemption law, and urges that a stay law be
