Mayor Cogswell, before retiring, submitted the following report:

the following report: To the City Council assembled:

Upon assuming the driles of the office I found a large amount of city currency in circulation, in addition to which there was a floating debt of some airty thousand dollars at an interest of one and a half per cent, per month. The neglected condition of the streets, drains, gutters and sidewalks rendered it necessary for me to pursue a course of improvements.

All was a repairing the atreets having been commenced by my predacessor, I determined to carry it on as a public necessity. The pavements in the principal thoroughfares have been repaired, as well as on the main streets. The meightly columns which stood in front of the Circular Church, on Meeting-street, have been removed, and adds a great deal to the appearance of the post of the city of the city. A number of order and vacant lots have deen fenced in mostly throughout the burnt districts, him as a small cost, the owners of the lots bearing one half the expense.

A large number of carts and laborers were employed to fill up and level low lots, a matter of great importance as regards the sanitary regulations and health of the city. Old and worn out guitern have been removed, and new once replaced, side and main drains have been repaired, new pavements have been laid down in different parts of the city, new curbs for side walks have taken the place of o'd once; many low lots have have been drained and a large number of muisances then existing abated. The scavengers contract for cleaning the streets at my suggestion was cuanged, at a saving to the city of some £20,000 per annum, the werk going on as well as in former years, when it cost double that amount. A new shell road is being constructed in the upper wards, commencing from the intersection of Spring and Meeting streets, and terminating at the city boundary; the expense of constructing this road will not fall entirely on the city, a portion of the money having been raised by private contributions from merchants, farmers and other persons directly interested in it. HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

This department has been in operation for over two years and is supported mostly by the United States Government. Two hospitals have been established—one in Mazyck-street and the other in Hampstead. This department is under the supervision of Dr. Goo. S. Pelzer, the City Registrar, who has conducted the management of the same with great care and judgment. I have had the rent of the Hampstead Hospital reduced from \$1500 to \$300, thus saving \$700 per annum. The control of the entire Health Department and the support of the same will shortly be transferred to the city. General Scott has promised to turn over all the hospital furniture, together with a sufficient quantity of medicines to last over six months.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

The importance of sustaining and keeping his efficient branch of the city department his

The importance of sustaining and keeping this efficient branch of the city department has also been a subject of deep consideration. I found several of the companies without houses; their apparatus were housed in old stables and outhouses. Deeming it a matter of greatimportance, I brought the matter to the attention of Council and urged the immediate building of new houses, and, I am happy to say, that before retiring from office, I have the pleasure of reporting two engine houses and one truck house nearly completed, one of which is now coupled by the Phonix Company.

It is with pleasure that I bear testimony to the efficiency of the officers of the city, and more particularly the Clerk of Council, with whom I was brought in daily contact. Col. E. B. White will accept my thanks fer the efficient and able manner in which he conducted all matters referred to him while employed in the Engineer's Department. The operations of the entire Police Department have been, to a marked degree, efficient and creditable, and merit the approbation of the community.

The main guardhouse has been put in a perfect state of repair, the Mayor's Court room, officer's and private's quarters have been fitted up, also the yard and stables—the entire expense of the same having been paid out of the fines imposed in the Mayor's Court.

HOUSE OF CORRECTION. The establishment of an institution of this kind was very much needed in this city. The floating population having increased to some extent, I found it necessary to open the old workhouse for the purpose of confining persons who were brought before me for various misdemeanors. I have found it to work to my entire satisfaction, and has had a good effect.

THE PAYMENT OF OUTSTANDING DEBTS. I am happy to say that various notes due by the City Council when I came in office have mostly been paid, and the collaterals pledged for them have been released; negotiations have been made for the balance, at the rate of seven

CITY AUDITOR. I would suggest the propriety of establishing an office of this kind. The short time I have been in office convinces me of the importance of such an office.

IMPROVEMENTS

I would recommend to Council that, as soon as practicable, an appropriation be made for improving the Rutledge-street mall, for the convenience and pleasure of the citizens living out in that direction. It has become a great

resort for pleasure seekers.

In conclusion, I have only to express my thanks to the gentlemen who composed the old Board of Aldermen, for their kindness on many occasions, and for the support I have received in the administration of my office. The present Board of Aldermen will also accept my thanks for the support I have received during the short period of our administration.

I desire particularly to thank the citizens of Charleston for their liberality and good feeling, and for the consideration they have shown me; also the city press, who have always discussed my official actions with courtesy. I retire with my best wishes for the welfare of the citizens of Charleston, and hope that the succeeding Council may be actuated by judicious and patriotic views, and so discharge their important functions as to merit the approbation of the whole community whose interests and honor will be committed to their care.


