A Francoi. Story of Munder and Brusses. A shocking story of brutal murder, and swift lawiess punishment, among a party of miners travelling on foot over the Rocky Mountains to the Sweetwater mines, is reported in one of our Western exchanges. Hers, a Frenchman, and Armstrong, a Nova Scotian, had quarrelled, but apparently became reconciled, when Armstrong reopened the disagreement, and threatened Hess for taking some of his fobecco. During that fay the party entered a dangerous and difficult canon, through which they wound along a narrow ledge of rock, saveral hundred feet above the bed of the stream, which ran along at the foot of that fearful precipios.

At the point of the greatest danger, where the party bad to travel in single file, and several yards apart, Armstrong watched his opportunity to dodge behind a ledge of rock unobserved, and thus fall behind the others. Hess was the first man in the file. As he drew near the place where Armstrong was secreted, the latter stepped forth and followed his companions without seeming to notice him. Presently he knelt down as though to tie his shoe, and Hess, unable to pass, stopped within a few feet of him. The next moment, turning about to pick up his bundle, which had been thrown saide upon the ground, by a sudden change of movement he seized the unsuspecting Frenchman and hurled him over the edge of the terrible abyss.

HEADQUARTERS SECOND MILITARY DISTRICT, CHARLESTON, S. C., July 13, 1803.

In view of the approaching termination of the military authority derived from and exercised by virtue of the act of Congress passed March 2, 1867, entitled "An act to provide for the more efficient government of the rebel States," and the acts supplementary thereto, which laws are about to become inoperative by reason of the fulfilment of the conditions and nitations prescribed by the provisions thereof: And the State of South Carolina having, by its Legislature, ratified the Constitutional Amendment known

1. Upon the issue of the proclamation of the President of the United States, prescribed by section 3 of the act of June 25, 1868, announcing the ratification of the said Constitutional Amendment, the commanding officers of posts in said State will cease to exercise any and all authority conferred under said Reconstruction acts of Congress, except so far as necessary for the inauguration of the new State government and to close up unfinished business. 2 The terms of office and all official functions of

Registrars, Inspectors, Managers or Judges of Elecagents in South Carolina, appointed under the authority of the Reconstruction laws of the United States, will end at the date of the proclamation of the President, referred to in the preceding section, and all such officers or agents will, without delay, forward to these Headquarters any books or record relating to their official duties that may be in their possession. They will also transmit a list of the property purchased with public funds, and exhibit

the disposition made of it.
3. The Provost Courts now existing in Couth Carolina are abolished, and the records will be transmit

ted without delay to these Headquarters. 4. The tenure of all appointees to civil office in the State of South Carolina under the authority of the reconstruction laws of the United States will termi nate when their successors, elected or appointed be duly qualified.

5. All citizens who, at the date of the proclamation above referred to, may be in the custody of the military authorities, and held for trial for acts in violation of the Reconstruction laws of the United States or in violation of military orders issued under the authority of the said laws, will be discharged from custody, and the military prosecution dismissed.

6. At the same time all prisoners (citizens) held by militay authority for trial, whether in confinement or on bail, for crimes or offences cognizable under the laws of the provisional government of said State, will be turned over to the custody of the proper civ-Cauthorities; and all bonds, undertakings, deposits or other security for appearance of persons charged with crimes or offences as above, taken by military authority in this District, in pursuance of the provisions of General Orders No. 105, series 1867, from these Headquarters, will be turned over to the Attorney-General of the State, with authority to enforce

The Judge Advocate of the District will communicale to the Attorney-General of the State the history of each case so transferred, together with the depo sitions or other evidence or information upon which the parties accused have been arrested and held for trial. In like manner, the Provost Marshal-General will transfer to the Attorney-General all depositions, complaints or other information on file in his office in relation to persons accused who have avoided ar-

rest or have escaped from confinement.

7. All prisoners (citizens) who, when the aforesaid Act of March 2, 1867, becomes inoperative under the conditions and limitations prescribed by the fifth ection thereof, may be in confinement or custody by virtue of the final judgment and sentence of thorized by the said laws, will be continued in the said custody until entitled to discharge by expiration of sentence, or until the r cases are otherwise cusposed of by proper authority. Upon a writ of habeas corpus or other process issuing from a Court of the United States in the case of any prisoner so held, the writ will be promptly responded to, and the officer in making his return will set forth the material facts of the case. If such writ be issued from a State Court, the officer having the custody of any prisoner will make a respectful return to the writ, setting forth the fact that the prisoner is held: by virtue of the final judgment and sentence of a Court of competent jurisdiction, held under the au-thority of the laws of the United States, and tha the jurisdiction is exclusively in the Courts of the United States.

So much of the provisions of any orders issued from the Headquarters of any Department, District, Sub-District or Military Post in South Carolina as eserves certain jurisdiction over the sea islands of said State, embraced in the operation of Special Field Orders, No. 15, from the Headquarters of the Military Division of the Mississippi, dated January 16, 1865, is revoked, except as to questions of title arising under the provisions of the law of the United States, of June 16, 1866, the jurisdiction of which is in the Courts of the United States, and except also as to the reservations specified in section 8 of this orcause the boundaries of the Government reservations at Hilton Head, Bay Point, and Land's End to be resurveyed and distinctly marked.

10. The canvass returns, poll lists and ballots for the several elections held in said State, under the authority of the laws of the United States, will, as soon as practicable, be arranged and inventoried according to the several election districts, securely packed, and transmitted to the Secretary of State at

Columbia, for deposit and safekeeping. 11. Authenticated copies of the registration in each County of the said State will be prepared as soon as possible, and deposited in the office of the Secretary

of State. 12. Authenticated copies or all General and Special Orders, regulations and instructions issued by the District Commander, or by Post Commanders under

authority duly delegated, will be prepared; one set to be deposited in the office of the Governor of the said State, and the other in the office of the Secretary of State 13. Authenticated copies of all decisions affecting

rights of property will be prepared and deposited in the office of the Secretary of State. 14 Commanders of Poets in said State will immediately transmit to District Headquarters all records,
