THE DEMOCRATIO MEETING ON TUESDAY NIGHT -THE ATTEMPTS TO CREATE A DISTURBANCE.-We alluded briefly yesterday to the circumstance that a number of negroes attempted to interrupt the Democratic meeting held on the previous night, by shouting and cheering for Grant and Colfax. Facts which have since come to light show that the colored men on the ontaburts of the crowd were acting according to a pre-arranged plan, and that it was their purpose to provoke a collision between the Democrats and the Radicals.

Soon after the meeting was organized, the tree-boxes near the stand were torn down by the Radical negroes. These were their arms and they at once began to yell and curse at the white men near them. They shouted, "down with the rebels," "drive 'em home," "cut their throats," "d- the white monkeys," varying the tune occasionally by calling for three cheers for Grant, and by attempting to sing, "Rally round the flag."

The white people and the colored Democrats who were with them took no notice of these demonstrations, and the meeting was quietly adjourned when Judge Aldrich had finished speaking. After the adjournment a number of negroes crowded up to the platform, saying they would at once use it for a Grant and Colfar useting. In this they were disappointed, for the stand was guarded by the members of the Democratic committee until it was taken

One of the peculiar features of the occasion was a stump speech made by Sam Dickerson, a colored Radical. He told the negroes that they were a disgrace to their party; that the Democrats did not interrupt their meetings, and they must not trouble the Democrats, and that if they did they would bring down upon themselves the ill-will of the whole community. This was not palatable to the negroes, who threatened him with violence, and he would have been mobbed but for the protection given

him by the police. There is no doubt that the whole movement was directed and arranged by the white leaders of the Radicals. The forbearance and patience of the Democrats averted any outbreak. but if such demonstrations are allowed to continue there must be serious trouble. It is the duty of the police to see that peaceful public meetings are not interfered with, and as the Democrats never molest the Radicals when they have their gatherings, it is expected that they themselves shall not be annoyed by the foul words and gestures of a few turbulent

THE BANKEUPT LAW AMENDED .- The "fifty per cent. clause" of the Bankrupt law, as it is called, was so amended by a bill passed in the Senate on Saturday night as to allow all persons who apply before the 1st day of January, 1869, to have the benefit of the Bankrupt law whether they pay fifty per cent. of their debts

The bill is as follows:

"Be it enacted, &c., That the provisions of the second clause of the thirty-third section of said act shall not apply to the cases of proceedings in bankruptcy commenced prior to the first day of January, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, and the time during which the operation of the provisions of said clause is postponed shall be extended until said fi st day of January, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine. And said clause is hereby so amended as lo read as follows: In all proceedings in bankruptcy commented after the first day of January, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, no discharge shall be granted to a debtor whose assets shall not be equal to fifty per cent of the claims proved against his estate, upon which he shall be liable as the principal debtor, unless the assent in writing of a majority in number and value of his creditors to whom he shall have become liable as principal debtor, and who shall have proved their claims, be held in the case at or before the time of the hearing of the application for discharge.

"Src 2 And he if turther enacted. That said The bill is as follows:

"SEC. 2. And be it further enacted. That said act be further amended as follows: The phrase 'presented or defended' in the fourteenth section of said act, shall read, 'prosecuted or defended;' the phrase 'non-resident debtors,' in line five, section twenty-two of the act as printed in the Statutes at Large, shall read, 'non-resident creditors,'; that the word 'or' in next to the last line of the thirty-ninth section of the act shall read 'and,' that the phrase 'section thirteen, in the forty-second section of said act, shall read 'section eleven;' and the phrase 'or spends any part thereof in gaming,'

said act, shall read 'section eleven;' and the phrase 'or spends any part thereof in gaming,' in the forty-fourth section of said act, shall read, 'or shall spend any part thereof in gaming,' and that the words 'with the senior registrar, or,' and the phrase 'to be delivered to the registrar,' in the forty-seventh section of said act, be stricken out.

And be it further enacted, That registrars in bankruptcy shall have power to administer oaths in all cases, and in relation to all matters in which oaths may be administered by Commissioners of the Circuit Courts of the United States, and such Commissioners may take proof of debts in bankruptcy in all cases, subject to the revision of such proofs by the registrar and by the court, according to the provisions of said act."
