The military conference called by Russia, in reference to the dispute of explosive bullets, appears likely to take place. The President and Cabinet have decided that the treaty of 1828 between the United States and Prussia covers all of the States of the North-German Union lately annexed, so far as it applies to the arrest of deserters in United States ports from merchantmen and war vessels sailing from ports in the North-German Union.

The Work and the Cost.

The following acts and joint resolutions have been passed by both houses and are signed by the Governor. They represent about fifty days in work and seventy thousand dollars in United States currency:

- 1. An act to accept the benefits of an act donating public lands to the several States and Territories which may provide colleges for the benefit of agriculture and the mechanic arts. Signed by the Governor on July 22, 1868.
2. An act to authorize and empower the Governor to effect a loan in behalf of the State of one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars. Signed August 10, 1868.
3. An act to incorporate the Cheraw Hook and Ladder Company as a part of the Fire Department of the town of Cheraw. Signed August 17, 1868.
4. An act to incorporate the Langley Manufacturing Company of Edgefield County. Signed August 17, 1868.
5. An act to provide for recording certificates of sale issued to purchasers of lands sold under direction and authority of the United States Direct Tax Commissioners in Beaufort County. Signed August 21, 1868.
6. An act to make appropriations for the payment of the expenses of the present session of the Legislature and to meet certain deficiencies in the appropriation for the fiscal year commencing first of October, A. D. 1867, made by General Orders No. 139, dated Charleston, December 5, 1867. Signed August 21, 1868.
7. An act to regulate appeals and writs of error to the Supreme Court. Signed August 21, 1868.
8. An act to provide a Private Secretary for the Governor of the State. Signed August 21, 1868.
9. To regulate the manner of keeping and disbursing public funds by certain officers. Signed August 24, 1868.
10. An act to organize the Circuit Courts. Signed August 24, 1868.
11. An act to establish a police force. Signed August 24, 1868.
12. An act to authorize a loan to redeem the obligations known as "Bills Receivable" of the State of South Carolina. Signed August 26, 1868.
13. An act to authorize a State loan to pay the interest on the public debt. Signed August 26, 1868.
14. A joint resolution for fitting up and furnishing a residence for the Governor. Signed August 28, 1868.

The Veto of the City Charter Bill.

We print to-day in our telegraphic column the message of Governor Scott vetoing the bill to amend the charter of the City of Charleston.

There is no doubt that this would excite even more trouble and distrust than Governor Scott seems to apprehend; and if that election were held by virtue of an act which offered a premium to fraudulent and illegal voting, and placed resident citizens under the control of a newly imported swarm of country freedmen, the consequences could not fail to be such as would be deprecated by any lover of peace, order and security.

Governor Scott, in this instance, has acted with sagacity and prudence, and has shown that he can so far rise above partisan feeling as to judge of a measure by its merits and probable effects, rather than according to the hopes and wishes of some few violent spirits amongst his political supporters.

The Fall Trade.

Notwithstanding the customary depressing influence of an approaching Presidential election, there is a good reason to believe that in the North and West, as in the South, the fall trade will be brisk and active. The full swing of trade may be somewhat late in showing itself, but this arises from causes other than dullness and want of commercial confidence.

The change in the credit system from six or eight months' time to ten, thirty or sixty days, has done its part in postponing the opening of the season, while the general use now made of the telegraph and express companies has done more towards securing the same result.

There should not, then, be any disappointment if the Northern and Western fall trade does not begin as early as it did when the means of communication with the interior were limited and uncertain. The wonderful advantages which the merchants now possess enable them to delay their purchases for three, four or five weeks, according to the distance of their places of business from the great centres of trade.
