Asphaltum Pavements.

To the Editor of the Daily News: The writer of the article on asphaltum pave ments, which appeared in yesterday's Mercury, could not have studied the subject properly, as in his anxiety to protect the tax-payers, he has neglected to state what was the comparative cost per square yard of the two pavements and has thus left the tax-payers in the dark. The sidewalk in Broad-street was not laid by a Northern contractor, though the pavement has been patented and largely used in the Northern cities, where it has given great satisfaction It differs in some respect from that laid by a "resident," but the contractor has as yet placed no price upon his work, leaving it for an intelligent public to determine its utility before he takes this step. The price of such a pavement cannot be calculated by that paid for similar work elsewhere, as athe estimate is always based on the cost of labor and material in the place where it is used. The reporter of the Mercury should have furnished the public with the cost of the tar painting and sanding that was necessary before the Meeting and East Bay street sidewalk was made durable. Until this fact is ascertained, the contractor of the Broad-stree pavement feels some hesitancy in placing a value on his work. He would also like to know the Mercury's source of information which places the difference in the cost of his work so far beyond that laid by the "resident." 
