Garrett being a man of peace, thought the law was his best defence, and he indicted Francis for sending a challenge contrary to the Club House constitution.

ARRIVAL OF THE BALTIMORE STEAMSHIP.—The "Falcon," Captain Horsey, arrived here at daybreak yesterday with the largest assorted cargo ever sent here from our sister city, embracing a list of consignees not only in all departments of business in Charleston, but also for the principal depots in this State and Georgia, showing clearly that a gain of twenty-four hours' time from Baltimore to Atlanta and more Western points via Charleston, as compared with Savannah, is becoming known and felt. Such an advantage must increase the business of these swift and wonderfully regular steamers.

A NEW DEVELOPMENT.—ANIMAL MAGNETISM. The operators of the Telegraph Company in this city have recently effected several changes in the arrangement of their material. Within the last few days another and more powerful battery has been added, which is worked on a different principle from electricity. After some practice on this instrument the operator is enabled to perform a variety of wonderful evolutions, and experts can almost fly through the air. The apparatus is extremely simple in its construction, but when properly manipulated the most wonderful results are attained. As it is the private property of the operators it is not kept in the main office, and is only used when the wires are not working. Nevertheless, the operators will take pleasure in exhibiting the "battery of animal magnetism" to the curious in such matters.

THE COTTON CROP OF THE UNITED STATES.—We ask attention to an article which is published in the News of this morning, on the estimate of the cotton crop of the United States lately published by the New York Shipping and Commercial List and the New York Financial Chronicle. It indicates very strongly the want of reliability in the amount of the growth as published in these journals, and we hope that the discussion will be kept up until a better system is arrived at in obtaining the sum total of the yield of the United States. To the Southern people, who are at present raising cotton under so many difficulties, and who are largely dependant on a remunerating price for their resuscitation, it is of the highest importance that over estimates of the growth of the article should not go forth to the world to prevent them receiving the just reward of their labors.

A PETITION FROM THE SHIPPING MERCHANTS. A petition from a number of the prominent shipping merchants of Charleston was presented to Council at the meeting last night, praying that body to remit the tax recently imposed of \$1 on every \$100 of all freight and passenger lists of all steamers or sailing vessels paid, or payable in this city, the same by this persons tax, the shipping interests would be impaired, and the growth and prosperity of the city would be seriously retarded. The new tax bill was framed from one in force in Savannah, which, it is stated, a similar tax is levied. The memorial has been referred to the Committee on Ways and Means, who will report at an early day, and the petition will appear in the official proceedings published on Saturday.

THE REPUBLICANS RALLYING.—According to a call issued by T. M. Holmes, chairman of the Republican organization in Charleston County, meetings were held in Wards Nos. 1 and 2 last night. In Ward No. 1, the old delegates elected at some time to represent the ward at a County Convention, were re-elected. In Ward 2, strenuous efforts were made by the friends of Brown and Mackey to prevent the representation of the ward in the County Convention. Sheriff Mackey, who heartily endorsed the nomination of Bowen, offered a resolution to the effect that the ward do not go into an election for delegates to the County Convention. As this resolution had the effect of leaving the delegation previously elected by the ward in full power, it met with the approval of the majority present. The County Convention meets this evening at the Military Hall, for the purpose of electing eight delegates to represent Charleston County in the Congressional Convention, to be held on Thursday evening at the same place.

THE REV. DR. CONROUR.—The following extract from an article in the August number of the Catholic World, a monthly magazine of general literature and science, entitled "The Second Plenary Council of Baltimore," is a high tribute to a distinguished divine of Charleston. After speaking of Archbishop Spalding, the writer says:

D., of the diocese of Charleston, deserves to be especially remembered for his industry, his erudition, his talents. EXTRA MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL.—Present: The Mayor, Aldermen Potter, Cunningham, Lindstrom, Wall, Olney, Wallden, Voigt, Howard, Marshall and Moore. The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed. The application of G. F. Habenicht for a license to pack loose cotton was referred to the Committee on Licenses. The application of E. Salas for an auctioneer's license was referred to the Committee on Licenses. The petition of the Vestry and Wardens of St. Paul's Church, Badoloffo, praying that the sidewalk in front of the Church be repaired, was referred to the Committee on Streets. The petition of Mrs. Anna Michell, executrix of the estate of John Michell, praying a reduction of the assessment of her property, was referred to the Committee on Assessments. The petition of James Mich 1 of his intention to erect a wooden building on Savage-street was referred to the Committee on Brick and Wooden Buildings. The applications of F. Opdebeck and others for tavern licenses were referred to the Committee on Licenses. The petition of John Corcoran for a transfer of junkshop license of L. Coupland was referred to the Committee on Licenses. A communication from the City Civil Engineer, asking authority to define street lines and erect landmarks, was referred to the Committee on Ways and Means. A communication from the Board of Firemasters recommending the erection of two more engine houses for two steamers, was referred to the Special Committee on the Fire Department. The return of the Harbormaster, showing receipts of \$316 40, was received as information. The petition of numerous taxpayers praying a relaying of the plank road on King-street, between Hudson and Shepherd streets, was referred to the Committee on Streets. A petition from sundry citizens asking that the sidewalks in West and Archdale streets be repaired, was referred to the same committee. The communication from the City Civil Engineer, stating that the extra clerks had been discharged, and asking that some of the number be retained, was referred to the Mayor, with power to act and report to Council. A petition from the street laborers, asking an increase of pay, was referred to the Committee on Retrenchment and Relief. A petition from the merchants in Hayne-street, stating that there were no gas lamps in that street and praying that the same be restored, was referred to the Committee on Lighting the Streets. A petition from the shipping merchants, asking a remission of the tax on freights imposed by the recent ordinance, as it would be prejudicial to the prosperity of the city, was read and referred to the Committee on Ways and Means. The account of the City Engineer for extra work done on the Phoenix engine house, was referred to a special committee of three to investigate and report. The Mayor appointed Aldermen Lindstrom, Weston and Cunningham. The Committee on Licenses reported favorably on the application of Messrs. Tobias' Sons. Adopted. The Committee on Brick and Wooden Buildings reported favorably on the application of E. Smiley to erect a wooden building on the corner of Puckney-street and East Bay. Adopted. The Committee on Accounts reported favorably on sundry accounts. The Committee on Lighting the City reported that the bills of the Gas Company were correct, and recommended that they be passed for payment. The Special Committee on the Fire Department reported unfavorably on the petition of Hook and Ladder Company, No. 1, to be allowed payment for certain changes in the plan of building. Accepted. The report of Mr. Wm. S. Hastie, city proxy to the meeting of the Memphis and Charleston Railroad, was read, and received as information. Alderman Olney gave notice of the following bill, which received its first reading by its title: A BILL to provide for the Liquidation of Interest and Arrears of Interest on the City Debt to 1st October, 1868. Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen in City Council assembled, That there shall be issued to persons holding stocks or six per cent. bonds of the city, and entitled to receive the interest thereon accrued, on the first day of October, a stock obligatory on the corporation. The said stocks or certificates thereof to embrace, for each person so entitled, all interest and arrears of interest due on the said first day of October, to bear interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum, payable quarterly, and to be redeemable in thirty days from date: Provided, that no part of said stock shall be issued for any sum less than twenty dollars, or for any fractional part of a dollar: Provided, also, that all such quarterly interest and arrears for less than twenty dollars, and for fractional parts of a dollar, shall be held in trust for the said stock currency, at the option of the city; and provided further, that any person, bona fide, holding stocks or six per cent. bonds on said first day of October, upon which interest has accrued, shall have the privilege, until the thirty-first day of December next, of discounting such interest, or any part thereof, against taxes due by him to the city on said first day of October, and may receive any balance in his favor in new stock according to the amount thereof, in manner aforesaid. Sec. 2. The form of certificate and mode of transfer of said stock shall be subject to the same regulations as now exist in relation to other stocks of the city. The communication of the City Engineer was, on motion of Alderman Lindstrom, indefinitely postponed. Alderman Weston offered the following resolution: Resolved, That an election for city officers be held at the next regular meeting, and the Clerk issue the orders for the same. In offering this extraordinary resolution, Weston said that he believed that a majority of the city officers were opposed to certain members of Council, and in case of a disturbance would rather aid than suppress it. The resolution failed for the want of a second, and Weston asked if the Mayor had the power to order an election. The Mayor replied that the peculiar position of Council prevented any reply until legal advice had been obtained. Weston then said that when this advice was furnished he would again press the motion. The following ordinance was ratified: An ordinance to relieve certain persons from paying fees to the Clerk of Council, and for other purposes. An ordinance to alter and amend an ordinance to establish and regulate the office of City Civil Engineer, ratified on the 29th day of February, 1867. An ordinance to change and modify an ordinance to raise supplies for the city for the year 1868, and for other purposes. There being no further business, Council adjourned. J. J. CHISOLM, M. A CHANGE FOR BUILDERS.—MORE ENGINE HOUSES WANTED.—At the meeting of Council held last night, a communication was read from the Board of Firemasters, praying Council to appropriate money for the erection of two additional engine houses, for the steamers Pioneer and Young America. These companies have been without any adequate shelter, the first since the fire of 1861 and the latter since their organization. Several efforts have since been made to secure new houses, and it is to be hoped that the treasury will soon be sufficiently plenteous to allow Council to grant the application.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of Charleston in City Council assembled, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same, That from and after the first day of January next, every person keeping a shop or store, or engaged in mercantile business in the City of Charleston, shall post up, and keep posted up, in some conspicuous place at his or her business stand or stand, a proper and conspicuous sign-board or placard, containing his or her given name and surname, and the name of the firm. An every person offering for sale or making default herein, shall forfeit and pay to the city a fine of ten dollars for each and every offence of default, and in addition thereunto a further sum of five dollars for each and every month during which the provision of this ordinance shall remain unaccomplished; provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall apply to the special partners of a limited partnership.
