M. The last car on each line will leave Broad-street at 9.30 P. M.

EXPORTS OF CORN AND FLOUR. -It is a fact worthy of note that the steamship Prometheus has cleared from this port for Philadelphia with a quantity of corn as part of her cargo, and that she could have obtained much more if she could have spared the room. Some corn has been already shipped this season for Boston, and the exports of flour to New York have been considerable.

Only about fifteen or twenty were white men, most, if not all, of them out of employment, and some of them men who had been employed on the police fifteen or twenty years ago. Beyond registering the names, residence and references of the applicants, no action was taken.

REPUBLICAN MEETING AT SUMMERVILLE. -At a Republican meeting held at Summerville, on Saturday, at a call from the friends of Joseph H. Jenks, to ratify his nomination for Congress, E. W. M. Mackey, F. J. Moses, Jr., J. J. Wright, G. W. H. Lee and B. F. Randolph, of the Bowen party, unexpectedly appeared upon the scene. The result was that the meeting, consisting of about three hundred negroes, ratified the nomination of C. C. Bowen for Con-

FIBE IN GEORGETOWN, S. C .- Quite a destructive conflagration took place in Georgetown, S. C., on Thursday night last, the fire commencing in the bakery of Mr. N. Emanuel, and it passed from there to a number of small stores in the vicinity, some nine or ten of which were destroyed. The names of the parties or the amount of the loss we could not learn. A second fire broke out a few hours after the above, in the store of Mr. Ellis, which was also burned.

THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS .- The exercises of the public schools were resumed yesterday, and, notwithstanding the unfavorable weather, there was a large attendance of scholars. A number of pupils were promoted from the St. Philipstreet Public School to the Normal School; a number of little girls in the latter made happy by being promoted from lower to higher classes. The public schools have, ever since their reopening after the war, been the only source of instruction open to many of the children of Charleston, and it is fortunate that they have been so well conducted. They challenge comparison, not in extent, but in efficiency, with the public schools of any other city in the United States.

IRISH DEMOCRATIC CLUB. -A large and enthusiastic meeting of the Irish Central Democratic Club was held at Hibernian Hall last night. Mr. James F. Slattery presided, and interesting addresses were delivered by Messrs. Armstrong, Cosgrove and Kenny. Resolutions were adopted ratifying the nomination of Seymour and Blair, and expressing a determination to harmonize and work with the German element and declaring a hope of victory in November. A resolution was also adopted for the appointment of forty-eight vice-presidents, six from each ward. The resolutions and addresses were received with much applause, and the whole proceedings showed that the Irish Democrats of Charleston were alive to the interests and zealous in the, cause of the

COURT OF CHANCERY .- The Fall Term of the Court commenced yesterday, Chancellor Lesesne presiding.

After the sundry orders had been passed, Edward McCrady Esq., presented to the Court the preamble and resolutions adopted by the Bar at a meeting held upon the occasion of the death of Mr. Tupper, late one of the Masters | Manufacturers' prices.

#### Attempt to Break Jail.

THE NEGROES WELL ARMED-CLUBS AND SLUNG SHOT-A WELL CONSIDERED PLOT-HOW IT WAS DISCOVERED-VILLANY WILL OUT.

A plot was discovered on Sunday morning last, which, had it been successful, would have ist loose to prey upon this community more than one hundred of the most hardened villains who ever graced a jail or felt the halter

Early in the morning of Sunday one of the prisoners in Charleston jail sought an interview with the jailor, and told him that the prisoners confined in the tower and a part of the main building would endeavor to make their escape as soon as the customary church service was over. He said that the prisoners were all armed, and that they intended to make a rush immediately after church, overpower the jailor and turnkeys, break open the cells of the other prisoners, and set the whole gang with themselves free.

The jailor, Mr. Philippi, promptly armed the turnkeys and jailors, and allowed the prisoners to go into service as usual. An examination was then made of the rooms occupied by the prisoners. It was found that they had torn down boards from the ceiling, with which they had made about thirty clube, of which the handles or grips were wrapped with strips of blanket. With these clubs they had wrenched off the massive bolts, bars and hinges of eight heavy doors. Some of the bolts they had made into slung shots, the slings being strips of blanket. It was also discovered that each prisoner, when he went into the yard, took up a brick or stone, and there were huge piles of these missiles in the various cells. They were, therefore, well provided, and as the prisoners immediately engaged in the plot were sixteen in number, they could easily have overcome

All the missiles and arm; were cleared out of the cells, and when the prisoners returned to them after church, they were carefully secured. They saw at once that they had been found out, and made no attempt at resistance.

The ringleader was a white man, named William Taylor, from Williamsburg, who is in jail for burglary and larceny. He is a desperate ruffian, and, although in chains, declares that he will soon break out of jail. The other ringleaders, four colored men, named Thomas, Slocum, Johnson and Bradley.

The whole number of prisoners in the jail is one hundred and fifty, and the city has had a narrow escape of being thoroughly burglarised and garroted. Mr. Phillippi appears to have behaved with commendable firmness, and Sheriff Mackey has made arrangements which will prevent any similar danger in future.


