At the narrowest point, the Isthmus of Darien is only thirty-four miles in width. On the Pacific side there is an indentation which can be converted into a safe and spacious harbor. A small cutting has made the rivers Atrato and San Juan, which flow into either ocean, navigable by small boats, and these rivers present the advantages of head waters available for the canal during the entire year. The whole cost of a canal at this point, one hundred and fifty feet wide at the bottom and thirty-one feet deep, will fall short of \$100,000,000, the proposed capital of the new company.

The opening of the Darien canal would, in connection with the Pacific railroad, bring the commerce of the opulent East to our country, while it would be the means of extending the influence of the United States over the entire continent south of the Rio Grande. The South American States are being rapidly developed, and as the Pacific States grow in wealth and importance the want of a shorter route to the Atlantic will be greater and more apparent. There is no danger of overestimating the effect of the proposed canal upon our national trade and commerce, and it must not be forgotten that in the general progress and improvement the South would certainly share.
