SOUTHERN ENTERPRISE-MACHINERY MADE CHEAPER THAN AT THE NORTH-A BRIEF DE-SCRIPTION OF THE PHENIX IRON WORES .-Messrs. J. F. Taylor & Co., the proprietors of the Phoenix Iron Works, have been nutiring in advancing the mechanical talent end ability of Charleston. They have established a large foundry and machine shops, possessing ample facilities for all mechanical demands, and emsaving machinery. Mr. Taylor, the head of the firm, is a practical mechanic, whose skill has been widely acknowledged. A large portion of the machinery in hir: establishment has been made at the Phœnix Works, and they have successfully competed with the Northern manufac-

turers. The engine which drives the machine ry both in the Phoenix Works and in Mr. W. P. Russell's sash and blin I factory, was designed

by Mr. Taylor, and though of 120 horse-power, it occupies but a small space. It is upright, and made on a new principle. The boilers have sttached to them a low water steam guage, which instantly gives the alarm when motive power of the machinery is the same


