There is very little business doing to-day, and no change in prices. A review of the week leads to the assumption that, though the market has been quiet and sellers have not been able to get an advance either in cloth or yarn equivalent to the increased price of cotton, there has I een a not inconsiderable amount of business. This may be inferred from the fact that, although there is still a large production coming forward from the mills, there is not much complaint of accumulating stocks. The movement for lessening production is still confined to individual firms. The number of these is not inconsiderable, but surprisingly small when it is considered how much spinners and manufacturers are losing from not being able to command adequate or paying prices for yarn and cloth.

Various reasons are assigned for the continuance of so many mills on full time, when not only our own but foreign markets are over-supplied with cotton gods. Some say that mill-owners are not willing to turn their operatives idle in the prisence of an election, and others that they are afraid to resort to a stoppage or even short time, unless the movement were general, because they would be habte to have their best workmen engaged by those who should remain at full work. No doubt these and a variety of other motives obtain. The stoppage or partial stoppage of a mill implies in all cases a certain and very considerable loss in interest on capital, or in rent, besides other fixed expenses which remain much the same whether the mill is at work or idle. Then there are many manufacturers who have had large advances from merchants and commission agents, which cripple their independence in such matters.

The result is that spinners and manufacturers find

matters.

The result is that spinners and manufacturers find it easier to bear considerable loss on production than to brave these other tisks, and are going on in the hope that things may mend, though they see no prospect of it in the immediate fature. There is an expectation, however, that production will be much lessoned after the general election. The business of the week has been certainly much nearer the supply, and the sellers have been u able to get the prices they demanded, and quotations are little changed from last week.

Novemen 9.—10 speas in the language of the traite, "There is no market to-day."
