FREIGHT CARS FOR THE "PALMETTO LINE. Two freight cars for the "Palmetto Line" have just been turned out from the workshops of the South Carolina Railroad Company, which are handsome specimens of car-building, and reflect great credit on the shops and especially on Mr. Tobin Reed, the superintendent, under whose immediate direction they were built. The doors and sides of the cars bear the following inscriptions in the highest style of ornamental painting: "S. C. R. R." "The Palmetto Line." "New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Baltimore." "Selma, Mobile, New Orleans, Vicksburg." These being the names of the cities between which "The Palmetto Line" carries freight.

IMPRESSIONS OF CHARLESTON.—The editor of the Augusta Constitutionalist writing of a recent visit to Charleston, says : "It is pleasant to see a hopeful spirit pervade the community of Charleston. The people feel that the worst is over, and that brighter days are yet to come. Business is moving and extending. The main source of business prosperity - the cotton trade-does not show a large result. Thus far the receipts fall off some ten thousand bales from same date last year. But the prices are double, and the commissions realized are in proportion. There is every prospect of a considerable surplus in the hands of planters, and through this all branches of trade will receive a new impetus."

DEPARTURE OF THE EMIGRANTS.—The greater number of the German emigrants who arrived on the Gauss, some one hundred and seventyfive in all, will sail for Baltimore this morning, on the steamship Carroll. The inducements offered them to remain were all that could be desired or expected, and if they had been presented to them in their native country might have influenced them to embark for this port and settle in this State; but now the arrangements which they have already made for settling in the Northwest are too binding to be easily changed. Most of them have relatives at the places of their destination, at whose instigation they determined to emigrate, and even before they left Germany were so fixed in their determination to settle in the neighborhood of those relatives that they pu chased through tickets in Bremen for Chicago, Detroit, Milwaukee, &c.

THE MILLS HOUSE SALE .- The sale of onehalf interest in the well known Mills House Hotel building took place yesterday, and attracted the largest party of bidders and speculators which has been seen at an out-door sale | pitals. since the war. At 12 o'clock precisely Mr. R. S. Bruus, of the firm of Leitch & Bruns, mounted the steps of the old Customhouse, accompanied by Mr. E. W. Marshall, the assignee of the estate of Mr. Joseph Purcell, and will doubtless be able to contribute largely by other gentlemen. The red flag fluttered gaily, and the brisk auctioneer at once went to work. Mr. Bruns announced that the Mills House was built at a cost of \$160,000 in gold, and could not now be built for less than \$200,000. He also said that the receipts of the barroom had averaged \$80 per day, or \$60,000 in the year, and that an offer had been made to rent it at \$5000 a year. Mr. Bruns described the property, which is remarkably well situated at the corner of Meeting and Queen streets, and is of the following dimensions : East line one hundred and twenty-nine feet ten inches, north line two hundred and seventy-five feet four inches, south line two hundred and seventy feet, and west line one hundred and eleven feet eight inches. Terms-ouc-third cash, balance payable in one and two years.

The first bid for the unincumbered balf interest was \$20,000, which was gradually worked up to \$22,000. The auctioneer theu pushed up the bids by \$100 to \$23,000, when there was a slackening in the bidding. A fresh start was made, and the price ran up in a few seconds to \$26,000. From this point the bids were small in amount, but the corner of \$30,000 was turned at last. At this point the hammer seemed likely to fall, notwithstanding the winning eloquence of the auctioneer. But the competition was not yet over. \$31,000, \$31,200, \$32,-000 and \$32,100 were bid, and at last a bid was made of \$33,000. Then came \$34,000, \$34,500, \$34,600 and \$34,800, the property being finally knocked down to Cohen, Hanckel & Co., at \$35,000. This was a low price for the cost of the property, but it was a better price than could have been expected to have been obtained in these stringent times.

The half interest in the wooden house adjoining the hotel to the south realized \$3125. Also, the half interest in the brick house, next and north of Hibernian Hall, was sold for \$6000
