be bequeathed by him for the benefit of the wife alone to the exclusion of his children. -Mrs. Ernestine I. Rose presents her rem edy for infanticide, which, among other things, proposes to make the father of illegitimate children recognize such children as legitimate;

of course compelling them to do so by law. -A Paris letter says of the late Baron Rothschild: "It is said he was forced to establish a bureau of charity. His letters from ruined clerks who were to blow their brains out unless a certain sum arrived by a certain hour averaged one a day."

-The Swiss watchmakers are steadily ap. proaching perfection. In 1862 the average deviation of the Neufchatel chronometer was 1.61 seconds per day; but one was recently finished and tested which gave only .164 of a second variation in twenty-four hours.

-In the new British House of Commons there are twelve Independents, five Baptists, five Quakers, two Wesleyan Methodists, one Calvinistic Methodist, seventeen Unitarians, ten Presbyterians, six Jows, and twenty-six Roman Catholics, of whom one only represents .an Euglish constituency.

—At Dresden, a society of tradesmen has

been formed, in order to protect the members against dishonest debtors. It has about four thousand members. A list published by the society warns members against making contracts with seven hundred and fifty persons, who are named. -A volume of "Essays in Defence of Women,"

published anony nously in London, treats in a pleasant tone of topics which society never tires of discussing : "Beauty is Power;" "On Proposing;" "Ou Being Refused;" "Long Engagements;" "Should Married Women Dance;" "Sisters-in-Law;" "On Marrying Again."

-It is reported that Queen Isabella has written General Prim a letter, in which she calls on him to labor for her restoration to the throne, or at least for the establishment of her son, the Prince of the Asturias, as King; promising to let him be Prime Minister in the former case, Regent in the latter, and also to grant him "pardon for the past."

-An armed and organized body of lawless negroes on Skidaway Island have declared their purpose to obstruct the rivers, and to kill and murder every white man who shall dare pursue his avocation of fishing and oystering; and on the 16th instant, as a party of white fishermen were passing Skidaway, a heavy fire was opened upon them by a large body of negroes, who declared their purpose to rule those waters in defiance of law.

-A Washington letter says : "The opinions of Dr. Samuel Bard, editor of the Atlanta New Era, relative to further congressional reconstruction in Georgia, take members and senators here, of the Radical school, somewhat by surprise. Dr. Pard has become, through his paper, a power in the State of Georgia, and his deliberately avowed opposition to further Congressional interference in that State will have its effect not only within the State bounds, but elsewhere."

-Mr. Bonner has lost his famous and valuable "Auburn horse," which died on Wednesday evening of spasmodic colic. The Auburn horse was at one time regarded as the fleetest in the country, but Mr. Bonner now owns three which have exhibited greater speed. The present is the first loss of the kind that has befallen Mr. Bonner, and it is not without its compensation, as it gives him room in his stables for the promising horse "Bruno," which has thus far been excluded.

-The New York Evening Post proposes that Alaska shall be set apara as a home for convicted criminals. "State rights," however, may not admit of our overcrowded jails and penitentiaries being thus relieved; but if in our admiration of the absolutism of Russia we continue to have "political prisoners," we might further imitate that country in the good proceeding of sending them to freeze out life in the most inhospitable region at our com-

-The New York Times says: "A petition is in circulation for the pardon of Jefferson Davis and all others under presentment or indict\_ ment for having been engaged in the rebellion. Thus far, we believe, it has only been signed by Democratic members of Congress; but there are a great many others who would be very slad to see an end put to this dismal farce of trying to impose on the public by protending to wish to try Davis or anybody else in this

matter. It is time the curtain had fallen." -The murder of Mr. J. A. Gleason, in Charlotte, N. C., on Friday last, was even more unprovoked and coldblooded than at first reported. The whole affair originated from a difficulty occurring in the street, caused by the attempt of a negro policeman to arrest a white man. A crowd naturally gathered, and among them Mr. Gleason, who suffered some violence at the hands of a negro. He then turned upon him and the fellow ran. For this Mr. Gleason was afterwards arrested and taken before the acting mayor, and while in the

-The Washington correspondent of the Baltimore Sun writes: "The bill of Senator Wilson, relative to the Supreme Court Judges, introduced to-day, is regarded as rather a novel method of getting rid of the venerable and distinguished jurists who have for so long adorned that bench, and who are not progressive enough to suit the new fangled Radical ideas. Various methods have been proposed heretofore for the accomplishment of this object. The two Justices of the Supreme Court, now over seventy years, are Justices Grier and Nelson, and this bait is to be thrown out to them to give up their positions. In less than a decade Chief Justice Chase himself will have passed beyond this prohibited age, and this new measure is regarded as a covert way of paying off the score against him for his maintenance of his official integrity during the impeachment trial. This promised vengeance is, of course, a long time in prospective, but the most intimate friends of the Chief Justice know that the ambition to be in official station is his besetting sin, and hence a blow of this nature would strike him very hard. By reason of the hue and cry which has been raised against 'superannuated judges,' it is not imagined that any of the justices would be inclined to or ins tified by their friends in remaining after pass ing the prescribed term of years."

The Planters of the Scaboard and the Freedmen's Bureau.

Christmas Day.

Whatever may have been the bad effect of the Freedmen's Bureau in allowing subordinate officers to control, as they pleased, contracts entered into by the freedmen and their employers, there is no doubt that it was, during the last season, of great and substantial benefit to the planters of this State. The advances of provisions made to the planters by the Bureau, enabled them to continue their planting operations for another year, and now the generous indulgence of the government will allow those who have lost their crops to postpone payment for the supplies which were furnished them. For the most part, the sea island cotton crop has been a failure, and but for the wise and liberal conduct of the Commissioner of the Bureau, General Howard, many planters must have been hopelessly

ruined. We have already published the main particulars of the nature of the relief given to the planters by General Howard, and we now desire to call their attention to the necessity of making application to the special commission for this State, promptly and in

proper form. All applications by persons who desire an extension of time for the payment of their bonds, held by the Bureau, for supplies advanced, must be made by January 6th, next, after which date no applications will be considered.

The applications must be addressed to Colonel John R. Edie, Chairman of the Board, Charleston, S. C., and must set forth in tabular form :

1st. The value of supplies received. 2d. Number of acres planted, giving the articles planted, and the number of acres of cach.

3d. Number of hands employed, and terms

4th. The amount (if any) of indebtedness to omployees.

5th. Quantity, kind and money value of crop 6th. Cost of production, including labor and

rent.
7th. The cause of the failure of crops, and the reasons for making the application.

The application must be verified by the affi-

davit of the party making it, and supported by the affidavite of one or more disinterested The instructions of the Commissioner al-

low a large measure of relief to those who are entitled to receive it; but it is necessary that all applications should be made in the form and manner prescribed. We repeat, that all applications must be sent in before January 6, and advise all who des're to take advantage of the concessions made by the government, to file their letters at once.

(three small islands forming a French colony | tled to that good faith and justice which a white man would obtain. There is neither prudence nor common sense in provoking the red man to be our bitter enemy, and we cannot afford now, of all times, to be drawn into a costly Indian war.

The Black Hawk war in 1831-2 cost about

five million dollars and four thousand lives. The Seminole war lasted seven years and cost one hundred million dollars and fifteen thousand lives. The Indians numbered less than one thousand, and about three hundred of them still remain. The Creek war cost one million dollars. The Sioux war, in 1852, cost forty million dollars and three hundred lives. In 1864, a Chevenne and Sioux war cost sixty million dollars and one thousand lives. In 1867, there was another war with the Chevenues, which has already cost one million dollars. On the Pacific slope, during the last twenty years, Indian cutbreaks have cost in the aggregate three hundred million dollars. In New Mexico Territory, three campaigns against the Navaiges have cost thirty million dollars. Other Indian wars, on a small scale, with the claims for destruction of publican will please copy and send till to the office avannah and Charleston Railroad Company. private property, will make the cost of Indian troubles nearly one thousand million dollars during the last forty years.

If Sheridan and Custer be allowed to carry out their policy, and the old system of bad faith and treachery be persevered in, we shall have a general Indian war on our hands. Extermination will then be the cry, and at the rate of progress made in the Seminole war, this would cost one thousand million dollars, thirty-seven thousand lives, and the employment of one hundred thousand troops for ten years. Decidedly, honesty is the best policy.
