MEMORIAL TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY .- The following memorial was very largely signed yesterday, and will be for signatures in THE NEWS office

To the Hen rable the Senate and the House of Representatives of the State of South Carolina:

The memorial of the undersigned, citizens of the City of Charleston, in said State, respectfully showeth: That your memorialists have observed with regret,

that a bill has been introduced in both branches of the Legislature, to make valid the election of 'Oth of November, 1863. for Mayor and Aldermen or the Your memorialists, therefore, nost respectfully

submit for the consideration of your honorable ody, the following reasons why the bill herein reshould not become a law:

1st. B.cause the Acting Mayor and Aldermen of the ity of Charleston, the tribunal constituted by your honorable body to investigate such cases of 13, 1867: contested e ection, bave, after hearing both sider of the question, solemnly declared that they hold and believe that said election was illeral, and on that account they withhold cortificates of election from the named in the bill.

2d. Because the subject-matter of the bill refered to is properly a judicial question, and its merits an only be ascertained by a judicial investigation. 2d. Because the matter is now before the Supre ce

Court of the State (carried there by the coursel for the claimants), a tribunal of competent ju: isdiction, ceated under the constitution, and composed of udges chosen to their high office by your honorable body; and for the Legislature to interfere with the functions of a co-ordinate branch of the State government, would establish a dangerous precedent which might hereafter be followed by future Legislatures, and be calculated not only to degrade the udiciary by depriving it of its legitimate jurisdiction over questions of law, but tend also to invade the right of the people to elect their own rulers.

4th. Pecsuse, from the nature of the case, it would be impossible for the Legislature to hear and understand both sides of the question, and the passage of the proposed bill could not but be regarded as an ex parte law, affecting most injuriously the rights, liberties and property of a large number of the constituents of your hon rable body. Your memorialists affirm, without fear of success-

ful contradiction, that they are a law-abiding people, and that had they resson to believe that Gilbert Pillsbury and the persons named as Aldermen in sald bill had received a majority of the legal votes for Mayor and Aldermen, cast in said election, they would have acquiesced in the choice of the people, would have done all within their power to uphoid and support the City Council so chosen. It is only, therefore, from a firm belief that the claimant named in said bill were not the choice of a majority of the legal voters who voted at said election, and are therefore not entitled to their souts; and that the proof of this will be made out on the investigation of the case before a judicial triounal, that our memorialists have objected, and do'object, to Mr. Pillsbury and the persons named as Aldermon in said bill teins installed as Mayor and Allermon of the
