of Lent is observed but in a modified way. Moderate abstineace from food and an intermission from gaiety and pleasure is recommended in order that more time may be devoted to religious reflection and public devotion, the churches being frequently open for the latter purpose. The services throughout Lent are of a s'eadily increasing solemn character; and it is thought that the season greatly tends to spiritual good and religious development.

The regulations for Lent prescribed by the Right Rev. Bishop Lynch for observance in the Catholic Diocese of Charleston are as follows:

1. All the faithful who have completed their twenty-first year are, unless legitimately di-pensed, bound to observe the Fast of Lent.

2. They are to take only one meal a day, excepting Sundays.

3. The meal allowed on firstdays is not to be taken till about noon.

4. At that meal, if on any day permission should be granted for eating firsh, both firsh and fish are not to be used at the same time, even by way of searcester.

5. A shall ref.eshment, commonly called collation, is allowed in the evening; no general rule is to the quantity of food permitt dat this time is, or can be made. But the practice of the most regular Christian is, never let it exceed the fourth part of an ordinary research.

6. The quality of food allowed at a collation is, in this Diocese, bread, butter, cheese, all kinds of truits, salads, veg.tables and tish. Milk and eggs are allowed.
