THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

Annual Meeting.—Resignation of the President.—Testimonial to Colonel A. O. Andrews.—Colonel Andrews' Valedictory.—Election of Officers.—Anniversary Dinner.

At the anniversary meeting of the Charleston Chamber of Commerce, held yesterday, at the hall of the old State Bank, the following new members, twenty-two in all, were admitted: Messrs. Wm. Watson, C. A. Hill, T. I. Witter, Bob' Murdoch, Jas. S. Murdoch, R. A. Tavel, R. M. Marshall, Henry Bischoff, Bernard O'Neil, J. F. Hunt, O'Connell, Reed, W. A. Boyle, T. H. Colcock, F. W. Macbeth, M. A. Jackson, H. B. Olney, Thos. D. Clancy, Geo. F. Von Kohnitz, A. H. Moore, R. E. Scriven, Allen S. Gibbs and A. Vanderhorst.

After the transaction of the usual routine of business, the President of the society, Col. A. O. Andrews, who for years past has filled that position with advantage to the Chamber and credit to himself, expressed his desire to be relieved from its responsibilities in the following brief valedictory:

Gentlemen of the Chamber of Commerce.—It is with great satisfaction that I meet you today—a satisfaction deepened by increasing numbers, and by the fact that it is an earnest of the improving condition of things among us and of that resolute, unconquerable energy, which I have had the pleasure to witness in you.

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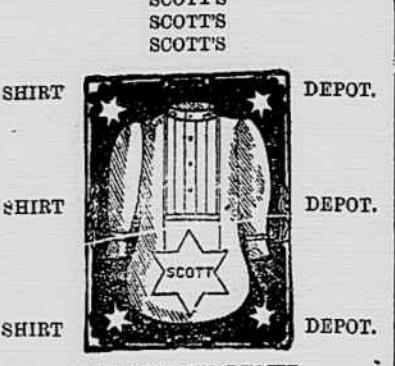
