THE WARRENTON TRAGEDY.

TWO DREADFUL MURDERS FROM ONE POLITICAL QUARREL-A COWARD MURDERS AN EDITOR, AND IS RIMSELF LYNCHED BY OUTRAGED CIT-

WARRENTON, GA., March 13 .- The excitement growing out of the murder yesterday morning, of Mr. Wallace, editor of the Clipper newspaper of this place, culminated in another terrible tragedy last night. The particulars of the whole affair are as follows :

There had previously been some difficulty between Dr. Darden and Mr. Wallace, on account of political sentiments, and more recently Dr. D., who is a Mason, and is connect ed with the Masonic Lodge at Warrenton, voted against Wallace becoming a member. To this implied insult, Mr. Wallace replied through his paper, in a long and scathing abuse of Dr. Darden, and on yesterday morning, while walking quietly through the streets of Warrenton, he was shot from a window with a doubleing off the entire top of his head, and killing instantly. The closing paragraph of the card published by Mr. Wallace, referred to above, is as follows:

"Many of our best citizens who have con-"Many of our best citizens who have con-ceived a favorable opinion of Masonry, beld themselves aloof on account of this individ-ual's membership, knowing his cowardly dis-position, and fearing him as a coward. In conclusion, I would say, that if any Mason who voted on the occasion referred to will vindi-cate Darden, I will make ample reparation; but if no Mason feels it his duty to give Darbut if no Mason feels it his duty to give Dar-den justice other than this, then I again brand him as a liar and villain. I can be found at my office at any time, and if the Doctor sees proper to practice on me, I am his patient, but not without fear that he will administer poison or attempt a surgical operation on my back with a scalpel, in the dark.

After the shooting of Wallace, the citizens of Warrenton became so ince med at the atrocious manner in which it was done, that Darden, by the advice of a few friends, and desiring to preserve his life, gave himself up to the sheriff of the county, who promptly placed him in jail, and locking it up made his way to Augusta-the sheriff admitting him in jail armed. At intervals, and nearly all through the day, crowds were seen on the street corners discussing the killing. Things thus progressed until night, when a lowd of men, numbering some twenty-five or chirty, assembled and proceeded to the jail, demanding from Darden that he should give himself up to them. He refused, and the crowd piled a lot of rubbish against the door and under the jail, and attempted to smoke him out. Darden then cried out that he would give up his pistol and yield to their wishes; but when they came near, the smoke having gradually left the house, he again refused. The crowd then became more incensed, and made another applieation of rubbish to the house, and again smoked him. This time the smoke and heat became so intense that he was heard to feebly ask to be let out. The crowd broke open the jail and took from it their victim. They then conducted him to his office, and allowed him to write a letter and make his will. He was notified that his time was up, and they gave him a few moments to make a last appeal to God, which being done, they escorted him out to the public streets and there shot him until every spark of life left his body, piercing him with no less than twenty-five balls. I'hus ended another fearful tragedy.

FROM THE STATE CAPITAL.

The Louves and Fishes-Resolutions of the Indignation Meeting-A New State for the South Carolina Offices-All the Names-The Appropriation Bill-The Chatham Kailroad Bill.

[FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.] COLUMBIA, S. C, March 13, 1869 .- The great indignation meeting was held last evening. Rev. B. F. Jackson presided. The speakers on the occasion were Senator Leslie, Speaker Moses, W. J. Whipper, Dr. B. A. Bosemon, W. E. Johnston, E. Runkle, R. B. Elliott and others. The speeches were generally of a moderate tone, gently remonstrating with the senators and representative against the proposed or rumored manuer of distribution of Federal offices in South Carolina. Senator Leslie offered the following resolutions, which were declared unanimously adopted:

Mercas, On the 3d day of November, 1863, the American people elected General U. S. Grant President of the United States upon the express understanding that he was to be the carnest friend of the Neconstruction acts of the Congress of the United States, and that he was pledged to see them faithfully executed; and,

Whereas, The opposition contested said election upon the grounds that said R construction acts were unjust, revolutionary, nutl and wid, and that the present State governments of the South established by virtue of said acts ought to be and should be superseded in the event of the election of keymour and Blair; and,
