It is self-evident that the planters and farmers of the country are liable to great imposition in having worthless mixtures or adulterated guan" passed off on them as valuable manures, and that it is the duty of the State, as far practicable, to project them from such swindles. If, then, it were possible to get a good man as inspector of guano or ter:ilizers, and every ton so'd could be made to pass under his inspection, a great public good would be accomplished, which would ore than compensate for the high salary which such | make arrangements for the appearance of the tificate of such an officer wou'd be the only guarantee that the purchaser need have that he was getting a good article. But if the office should be filled as most of the State offices are, with a man who would look only to plunder, the thing had better be left alone, and planters and farmers left as now to find their only security in dealing with responsible houses. Charleston manufacturers of fertilizers, and Charleston merchants of standing, who are agents for manures, have too much at stike to sell a bad article, and their bill of sale is as good as any inspector's certificate. The chief use of an inspector would be to protect the regular business men as well as the planters from sharpers, and that would not be effected if the inspector was himself a sharper.
