DEATH OF COLONEL ALLAN MACFARLAN. We are pained to announce the death, at the Mansion House, in this city, at eleven o'clock yesterday morning, of Colonel Allan Macfarlan, for many years past one of the most prominent planters as well as one of the most public spirited citizens of Chesterfield District. His disease was consumation. from which he had long been suffering; but the immediate attack of illness which resulted in his death

was but of two weeks' duration.

Colonel Macfarlan had reached his fiftieth year. He was born at Greenock, Scotland, and came to South Carolina in 1838. He completed his collegiate course and graduated at Princeton College, aft-r which he took up the study of law in the office of 'ne late James L. Petigru. Faving fixed his residence in Cheraw, he devoted himself chiefly to agricultural pursuits, and for many years represented Chesterfield County in the State Legislature. in a remedy under the act which they might not have the furtherance of all enterprises looking to the public benefit of the State, he was a leading spirit; and at the time of his death, be filled the presidency of the Cheraw and Darling on Railroad, and was also an influential director of the Northeastern Rail-rosd. THE CONTESTED ELECTION.

In the Circuit Court, on Saturday, the Hon. D. T. Corbin read the reply of the petitioners to the pleas of the counsel for the defendants, in the marter of the writ of quo warranto, and also the reply of The law of 1868 gives the property and the offices to the relators to the return of the respondents in the CULATION IN THE CITY OF CHARLESTON, matter of the writ of mandamus, it being understood that the petitioners and relators are Gibert Pillsbury and his Board of Aldermen, and the defendan's and respondents the Acting Mayor and Alder men of the Cite of Charleston.

In the matter of the quo warranto, the Hon. W. D. Porter, for the detentants, said that this was the first notice be and his associates had had of the pleas to be made by the counsel for the claimants It was necessary that a rejoinder should be made and the unprepared condition of counsel showed conclusively that attempts to hurry and press the case would not lead to an earlier, safer or better result. Take, for instance, the first plea contained in the paper just read. The Acting Mayor and Aldermen, by their coausel, in their pleas to the writ of que warrante, said that a writ of que warrante was pending in the Supreme Court, as appeared by the records, and prayed that the present writ be quashed. Mr. Corbin, in his plea, said there was no such record. Now it was impossible to determine this question of fact without the records of the court, which he had been unable to obtain, the clerk having taken them with him to Lexington. All that they could find out was that the writ was marked 'discontinued," which was, perhaps, authorized by Mr. Corbin to be done. But the ground taken by him (Mr. Porter) was that counsel had no right to mark a paper of he kind "discontinued," which can only be done by order and leave of court. It is a civil proceeding, and if the case is discontinued the court may give costs, and how could this be done inless the court decides upon the discontinuance. The truth was that the case was not ready for trial, the evidence was not complete, and if the court de-

sired a sure and proper decision, time must be given. Mr. Corbin desired an immediate hearing, and said that he would admit the facts to be as stated by the opposing counsel in regard to the "discontinued" vrit. He had requested the clerk to so mark it, and there had been no order of court, but he could not be forced to go en with the writ in the Supreme Court. The other side could take a judgment, but could not force him to go on.

After some conversation between Mr. Porter and Mr. Corbin, in which the former argued the absolute necessity of a postponement, and the latter urged that the case should go on at once, Judge Carper ter said that the proceedings in the writ of que war rante would be continued to Friday, when counsel must be ready and the pleadings made up. It being agreed to proceed at once with the mandamus, Mr.
Porter said that be desired to confine the question at this stage to whether mandamus was the proper remedy to be granted the relators.

Mr. Corbin proceeded to argue the case f r Gilbert Pillsbury and the other claimants. He claimed that under their appointments and elections the Acting Mayor and ldermen had no right to continue in office. because their tenure was only until their successor were elected and qualified. An election had been held, the Acting Aldermen had declared that Pillsbury and others had received the largest number of votes, which declaration was, he said, equivalent to declaration of their election. The Acting Alderman had examined into the election, and at first refused to declare the election, but the Supreme Cour compelled them to make a declaration, and they could not go behind it. "As to the act of 1868 being contrary to the chartered rights of the corporators he argued that the city was always subject to the deeisions of the Legislature, which had a control over all municipal corporations, of which it could not divest itself. The charter existed at the pleasure of the Legislature, and could be taken away so long as there was no contract (and none existed) and no interference with chartered rights. Mr. Corbin cited

Where office was held by color of right the quo warranto was the proper remedy. He then showed by the admissions of the other side in their return that the Actin: Mayor and Aldermen were duly elected or appointed. They must hold office until their successors were elected and qualified, and the claimants were not duly elected and qualified. The Acting Board were thus brought within the reach of the authorities given, which determine that mandamus is not the proper remedy.

Mr. Miles followed on the same side, contending that mandamus would he to compel a person to do a thing which he was bound to do and had omitted to do, but not when to doe that thing would be to removehimself from office. The Acting Aldermen were not merely asked to give up the insignia of of fice; they were asked to vacate their office. If the claimants have a proper remedy by quo warranto the court will refuse the mandamus. He cited au thorities sustaining this view and showing where a mandamus to persons claiming office had been refused until the persons holding office de facto ha been ousted

Mr. Porter followed, and discussed the difference between the operation of the mandamus and the quo warranto, argeing that if offices were vacant and certain persons rinimed admittance, the mandamus could issue to admit them: but that if offices were filled de facto, if not de jure, as in this case, the offices were held by color of title, and quo warranto was the only remedy. If the court granted the man damus, the Acting Mayor and Aldermen would be forced to vacate and give up their offices to the claimants, while the very question to be determined was whether the claimants had a right to those offices. If the quo warranto succee s and the writ of ouster is granted, the present holders cease to be public officers and there is a vacancy, and until there is a vacaucy no mantemes can be granted. Mr. Forter said that the parties whom he repre

sented were not acting from any factious, stul-born or improper motives They believed that they repr.sented rights and privileges which ought to be re spected, and they only desired to have them r. spected according to the law of the land. They made no appeal to force, but to the courts of law. A great question of public liberty was concerned, which should be considered and determined in a liberal spirit. All great principles had been established by individuals who were willing to expose themselve to annoyance, to obloquy and even persecution, to establish great public rights. The Acti g Mayor and BRASS AND GERMAN SILVER KEY-Aldermen were actuated by no-other spirit. They bring this case before the court, and ask for its calm

It will be seen that the arguments on the side of the Acting Mayor and Aldermen were purely technical, as their counsel did not no into the question of the value of the declaration made by the Acting Board of Aldermen, or into the constitutionality of the law of 1863, or into the question of the intringement of the rights of the corporators of Charleston upon all of which points elaborate arguments wil be made when the case comes up upon its merits.
