ODD FISH.

The Kraken and the Sea Serpent—Authentic Details in Regard to their Appearance and Size.

From an interesting article on this subject, in the April number of Putnam's Magazine, we glean the following: The existence of the Kraken (which Webster defines as a fabulous sea-monster of monstrous size) is a subject of incredulity, though tenaciously maintained by its hold on the wonder of man.

Among these other tales are told of the monster. In the seventeenth century it was believed that but few existed, but that they were immortal; which belief was not ever shaken, when in 1680 the carcass of one of these creatures was discovered in the Gulf of Newagen, in the Parish of Astabough.

During one century the facts have been stripped of all exaggeration and the existence of such monsters placed beyond all controversy. A kind of mollusk called cephalopods, was found in various seas, the peculiar formation and spiral appearance of which sufficiently explain the marvelous tale of the kraken.

The most remarkable story is that of a Danish sailor, Captain John Magnus Dens. He was once becalmed off the coast of Africa and a kraken rose from the bottom of the sea, and set the crew to cleaning ship. All at once a great mass of water, and sank out of sight.
