THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Exercises of the Annual Examination Number of Pupils-List of those Distinguished in Each Class.

The public school system of Charleston is probably as successful as that of any city of the United States, certainly of the South. Contending against great obstacles in its first inception, and the mos nparalleled misfortunes in the few short years of its existence, it now stands a monument to the wisdom of its founders, and a mighty benefit to the people of the city. The secret of this has been a strict regard to the character as well as the . ficiency of the teachers, and a rigio cof, recment of the dis cipline of the schools. THE NORMAL SCHOOL. Very soon after the door of this school was pened, visitors, principally ladies, began to pour in, and in a short time they, with the scholars, formed as dense a throng as the building could hold. The exercises were opened by the reading of the Bible by the Hon. C. G. Memminger, which was followed by the united school repeating the Lord's Prayer, in a musical, accurate and reverential manner. A hymn was then sung, after which the geographical exercises were core through, and then a chant, succeeded by arithmetical exercises, in which the pupils displayed singular proficiency. The scholars were dismissed to their class-rooms, and in reaching the they preserved an order which spoke highly for their discipline. A moment was spent in viewing the artistic decorations in the main room. Festoons of evergreens hung around the pillars and walls, where there were wreaths in which were appropriate mottoes. Over the rostrum, retired somewhat, beneath the canopy of flowing garlands, was the talismanic word, "Excelsior." Spanning the entrance was the large motto, also of cecar letters, ·By perseverance we overcome difficulties." In similar characters on the north wall was "Labor conquers all things," and on the south wall, "Knowledge p ower." The minor mottoes wire: "Hasten slo wly;" "Strive to please and do it right;" "Know th yself, learn to wait;" 'Time is money;" "I will try, I shall wait;" "Well began, better done," &c. all of the other departments and rooms were also

decked with flowers, some baving moss baskets suspended from the ceiling. The principal of this school is Miss Anna R. Simonton, who, with her competent corps of assist ants, may well feel ; roud of the pupils, who showed a great proficiency in their ready responses. Divisi on A delivered a French recitation in a creditable manner, and division B, Longtellow's touching poem of "The Sinting Ship." The songs, "Softly and sweetly music shall flow" and "Bearts and Homes" were happily rendered, while one of the teachers presided at the piano, on either side of which was a fine voiced schoor to lead the masses. Drawings illustrating mechanics, by Misses Adolphine E. Pointel and Laura W. G. Kelly, were almost faultless, and showed a knowledge physics, not generally possesed by school girls or even their seniors. The examination in the various class-rooms being satisfactorily completed, there was a general assembling in the main room, where the Hon. C. G. Memminger, on behalf of the Board of Commissioners, read the list of prizes Mr. Memminger took occasion to make a few remarks to the scholars, urging them to diligent and persistent efforts to acquire the great b on, education. He related the well known anecdote of Bruce and the spider, and adapted its moral to the indus try which should char. ctarize the pursuit of any aim in life. He spoke of the gratitude the schol rs should feel for the educational advantages afforded the m, and paid a compliment to the teachers under whose auspices so much progress had been made-a progress that had not been surpassed in the school in the same length of time.

TESTIMONIAL TO THE PRINCIPAL Through Mr. E. Montague Grimke, the Secretary of the Board, the scholars presented the Principal, Miss Simonton, with a silver goblet and salver. in felicitous terms made the presentation, and re ferred to the recipient's services in sentiments of the highest encomium. Miss Eimonton was so overcome by surprise that she requested the Hon. Mr. Memminger to respond for her, which he did in his he hoped that the frie-dship and interest of the pupils in the principal would endure even longer than the metal of which the presents were made This event closed the exercises, with a benediction by the Rev. Mr. Pinckney, at the Normal School, and i may be said that the examination of no previous year gave greater satisfection to the commissioners and visitors. The Manue errors (coronen) school.

The experiment of sustaining a colored school on the Normal pr neiple has proven a success; and has, though it has been in operation only about eighteen months, shown marked signs of enduring progress. It was opened on the 23d of September, 1867, with but 84 pupils, and has rapidly increased in numbers, until yesterday it registered 914 pupils. Its department principals and seventeen class teachers. The male department has 182 pupils, the female 255, and the primary 477. Spelling, reading, writing and arithmetic are taught in all classes. History in two and grammar in one. The pressure in the primary department has been so great, as to necessitate four or five prometions to the grammar department, in eighteen months. The educational grade of the school is somewhat low, but the interest of the pu-

pils is very encouraging. The discipline is not excelled by any school in the city, and is easily enforced. The teachers show great pat ience, and are carnest and careful in their efforts to adverte and ameliorate the morals of their charges. The solid and rapid progress of the first and second classes in the male department was especially patent since the last examination. This school is more than twice the size of any colorid school in the city. It was tasterully decorated, and was attended by the parents of the scholars Dr. J. S. Thorne, of Brooklyn, President of the New York State Board of Education, was one of the visitors to this school, and delivered a short address in happy and very appropriate language, much to the gratification of the principal, teachers and scholars.


