The Pumpkin Hill Channel, at present used, will permit a passage, at fair tides, of seventeen to eighteen feet, and even eighteen and a half has been successfully brought in The British propellers, which are now coming into the cotton trade of the South do not require more than this, and pass in and out of our port with facility, and it is probable that three-fourths, of the world's commerce is transported in ships of no greater draft; but notwithstanding the present depth is suitable not only for our present traffic but for a largely extended trade an improvement in the amount of water on the bar would have its advantages. This subject was attracting much notice, and a dredge boat, constructed by our enterprising fellow-citizen, J. M. Eason, Esq., had been used with considerable success on an entrance to the harbor known as Maffit or Beach Channel immediately next to Sullivan's Island; but the late unfortunate struggle put an end to this and all other efforts for the improvement to the sea entrance to the port. 
