CHIEF JUSTICE CHASE.

The court opened at ten o'clock yesterday morning, Chief Justice Chase and Judge Bryan on the bench. The court resumed the consideration of the case of Wm. M. Howland et al. vs. Thaddeus Kelly. Bill for foreclosure. This was a demurrer on the part of the respondents for the purpose of making Mr. Jervey, the executor of the estate, a party to the cause.

CHIEF JUSTICE CHASE.

Mr. Lowndes was heard against the demurrer, and Mr. Porter in reply. The Chief Justice decided that the executor who had taken the bond was a necessary party in the case. The bond was taken by Mr. Jervey as trustee or executor, and received for the benefit of the grandchildren of Mrs. Montefield. The property was to be divided among the children when they became of age. That event did not take place until the year 1866. It then became the duty of the executor to divide the estate. The proceeds of the bond were not distributed because the executor had received payment in Confederate money. The most of which could be said would be that the executor is accountable for the value of the Confederate money at the time it was received.

It also appeared that the bond had been received from Mr. Gray, Master in Equity, and was secured by a mortgage upon property on King-street, and not as an independent debt, but pro rata with other debts.
