"The Coolie Trade."

We print, this morning, an act of Congress, passed February 19, 1862, prohibit. ing what is known as the coolie trade. This act is commonly supposed to stand in the way of Chinese immigration to the United States, but a careful perusal of its provisions shows that it is only intended to prohibit the use of American vessels for carrying coolies from China "to any foreign country" to be disposed of or sold, or "transported for any term of years," "or for any time whatever, as servants or apprentices, or to be held to service or labor. In Section 4 it is expressly declared that nothing in the act "shall be deemed, or construed, to apply to or affect any free and voluntary emigration of any Chinese subject, or to any vessel carr, ing such person as passenger on board the same;" and it appears to us that the act only relates to the shipment of coolies in American bottoms to foreign ports, there to be hired out or sold. And if the act did refer to the United States, our planters might still make contracts directly with the Chinese in China. as there would then be no "transfer" for a term of years within the meaning of Section

The intention of the act is, to us, very clear, and we publish it entire, that our readers may see that the law does not debar them from making contracts with Chinese immigrants, any more than it hinders them from making engagements with the Irish or German laborer. The "coolie trade" is very properly prohibited, but there is no interference with free and voluntary immigration.

The Cost of Importing Coolies.

Some time ago one of our prominent shipping houses wrote to England to obtain some definite information in regard to the cost of shipping coolies from China to this side; and received in reply a letter, from

by last mail from our Hong Kong correspon dents, who wrote under date 19th October, 1868. They 82y:

" 'Regarding emigration there would be no difficulty in sending forward any number of laborers under proper regulations, if the contracts entered into are considered reliable. Some have receatly gone to the West Indies. They cost an outlay of forty eight dollars per head for shipping, clothes and chow chow (to bacco) for the voyage; wages five and six dollars per month, agreement for five years, then to be returned to China. But the precise terms on which any particular contract can be made cannot be ascertamed until details are with us. The regulations here are very strict and full care taken of the coolie's interest. A vessel would have to be chartered, which could be easily done here. Full authority with terms of contract would have to be sent out, with proof of their being binding nuder the law of the country they were carried out in, and bank credits for above advance per head, stores, medicine. doctor, &c.; passage or charter money could be made oavable on arrival."

We may add that the cost per head, for shipping and rations, from Hong Kong to Charleston, would not exceed the rate to the
