THE COUNCIL CHAMBER.

Last night-the time appointed to fill the city offices declared vacant by an ordinance of Council in May last-lound every member of the body in his seat. The aspirants crowded into the Council Chamber, thro ged the doorway, sat on the window sills, with legs dangling outside, in each others laps, hung by their chins arms and legs on the b nisters of the stairway leading up to the room in which sat the body soon to decide whether they should be exalted up to the seventh heaven by success or plunged 1010 the 'slough of despair by defeat, and crowded on the street corner all anxiously awaiting the decision. Inside of the Chamber there was perfect order, each member, especially the colored ones, being apparently protoundly impressed with the importance of the occasion, and determined to vote according to the dictates of his conscience, or as Mayor Pillsbury or Aldermen Mackey had dictated. The spectators, most of whom were aspurants, like the Aldermen, held little conversation, but listened breathlessly

and restlessly to whatever was uttered, and furtively glanced at the door of the Mayor's office, through which the incumbeuts of the city offices were constantly passing and repassing.
