He has nothing to say about his successors in the White House. It may be added that, according to the latest reported opinion of ex-President Fillmore, we are drifting to a despotism.

-New York is going to have a musical jubitee of her own. She has no idea of being surpassed by provincial Bosting, in matters musical or anything else. And as she can't well get up a bigger jubilee than the Hub's, sho proposes to surpass it by minim imizing the Boston explosion down to the limits of "artistic good taste." That is to say, she will have no monster building, no big chorus and orchestra, no anvils. no guns, and no Gumore clap-trap. The force in the different departments is to be "small but well selected," and it is proposed to furnish musical entertainment of a week's duration. The proceeds of the jubilee are to be devoted to the building of a music hall which shall be a credit to the city. Probably it will be a pleasant affair; but the New Yorkers ought to be able to strike out original projects, instead of resorting to Bos ton for ideas, and especially after the juice has been so effectually squeezed from the musical orange by that city.

The recognition of this drawback to the usefulness of the sewing machine has caused an effort to be made to discover some cheap means of applying power to the machines, and already several inventions for this purpose have been patented. One is an electric attachment. which has been spoken of very highly, but in all probability will be liable to the objection of high cost. Of course, where machines are employed, as in a large factory, steam may be applied with advantage; but it would hardly answer for every lady to have a small steam engine in her parlor. It would seem that some combination of springs or clockwork would be the most effectual method of attaining the desired end, and we learn from the Mining and Scientific Press that a device of this kind has been patented by a Californian inventor. Something of the sort is much needed; but to be of any practical use it must be both simple and cheap.

Governor Scott and the State Taxes.

The letter of Governor Scott, which w rinted yesterday, does not meet the one great complaint made by the taxpaying sitizens of the State. This is, that while the constitution and the tax law require that all property shall be taxed at its value, the State Board of Equalization have, in whole counties, doubled and trebled the taxable value of the property. The returns were made in the first instance, on oath and the assessments were "equalized" by the County Boards. Then the State Board stepped in and increased the assessment to twice and thrice the original amount. It is not pretended that the State Board had any information to warrant their arbitrary conduct. There was a difference in the value of land in the different counties; but neither this nor what Governor Scott calls the caprice and irregularity" of the official assessors can justify a proceeding which compels the honest taxpayer to pay \$3000 or \$2000 where of right he should pay but \$1000. Governor Scott may be of epinion that the property of the State should be worth \$206,000,000. This, at one time, was our opinion; but sufficient allowance had not been made for depreciation of values, and we are willing to accept the Columbia Railroad, near Alston, on Thursday sworn statements of our citizens as showing the selling price, the real value, of their property, at the time the returns were made No prating about expenses, or the price of State bonds, or the credit of the State, can make the conduct of the State Board any other than typannical, infamous and unjust There is no objection made to the system

of taxation. We are willing and ready to pay taxes in prepertion to our property so Chinese at San Francisco, and they reciprocat- that every county may bear its proper share of the burden of taxation. The system, in theory, is the best that we have here are hardly what they want, since there is ever had, and we do not wish to see it grating to changed. We cannot, however, quietly submit to having the value of our property assessed according to the caprice of a Board of Equalizers, who assume at the start that every taxpayer has perjured himself, and pile on additions right and left until the taxable fabric is high enough to bear the

weight to be imposed upon it. Governor Scott is unwise, to say the least, in threatening so many terrible things, "if "factious attempts be made to embarrass "the government, by the interposition of "the courts." We know to our cost that any appeal to the courts which interferes with the manœuvring of the Radical party is styled "a factious attempt to embarrass "the government." But the courts are still open, and there may be found a judge sufficiently free from party spirit to decide according to the law, and not according to party expediency. Our people have the right to apply to the judiciary for protection. The tax law itself contemplates such an appeal in giving as a sufficient cause for not collecting any tax "that (Section 98) "such taxes, assessments or penalties were "enjoined by a competent court." And when we know that under the law all real and personal property must be taxed "at its "true value in money," and that our property has been valued for taxation at far above its true value in money, we may apply to the courts for relief, without heeding the idle menaces of a man who might perform more if he threatened less. In vindicating the rights of the people we do not fear Radical "responsibility or edium;" for, in the words of Governor Scott: "A gov-"erament incapable or unwilling to main-"tain its dignity and enforce its laws against "open violence and covert fraud, is unwor-"thy of the name, and is a fit subject for "the pity and contempt of its friends and "the scorn and derision of its enemies" Such a government is that of South Carolins, where "open violence and covert "fraud" are sought to be used for the intimidation and impoverishment of our peo-
