DUG HIS OWN GRAVE.—A negro named Chas. Williams was arraigned before the Mayor yesterday upon the charge of stealing locks and keys. The charge was proven, and the Mayor sentenced Williams to remain under locks and keys for ten days.

CHARGED WITH MALFEASANCE IN OFFICE.—We were informed yesterday that the County Commissioners held a private investigation into the charges of malfeasance in office, preferred by Mark Reynolds, against F. C. Miller, formerly president of the Board of Commissioners. There are numerous reports afloat concerning the matter, but we refrain from further mention until authentic particulars can be given.

NEW COTTON.—Messrs. Polzer, Rodgers & Co. received on Saturday afternoon a bale of new cotton from Mr. D. K. Norris, Orangeburg, S. C., which, proving steady, was sold at thirty-two cents per pound. A bale of new Georgia received by the same firm, classed middling, sold at thirty-four cents. Both of these were purchased by Messrs. M. Goldsmith & Son. Messrs. George W. Williams & Co. received yesterday four bales of the new crop of South Carolina.

CHILDREN'S UNION MEETING AT SUMMERVILLE.—On last Tuesday there was a pleasant gathering of Sunday school children at Summerville, and addresses were made by Masters Walker Thomas, W. W. Thayer, Leroy A. Butterfield and C. Julian Smith. The exercises were interspersed by singing, in which the children joined with one accord. There was a large attendance and considerable interest manifested. It was the last of similar meetings held during the summer.

DRUNKARDS.—There were any number of persons drunk on Saturday and Sunday, and the following were arraigned before the Mayor yesterday: Susan Robinson, Francis McDowell, Ann Williams, Henry Hagerman, Sarah Gasden, Henry and Mary Ann Holmes, all colored. All, excepting the Holmes' family were sentenced to ten days' imprisonment each. The last named had a fight in addition to their drunk, and were required to remain twenty days in the H. use of correction.

A ROW BETWEEN WOMEN.—A MAN IN THE CASE.—George Fordham, Mrs. Hogan, white, Kate Lee and Mollie Sweeney, colored, appeared before the Mayor yesterday to answer the charge of being engaged in a general row. It appeared from the testimony, that Fordham rented a room from Mrs. Hogan, stating that it was for himself and wife. But instead of bringing that lady to the room, he placed therein Kate and Mollie. Mrs. Hogan ascertaining this, went up there and ordered the negroes to leave. Kate struck her in the mouth with a cup and Mrs. Hogan stabbed her. Kate was fined \$10 and the others discharged.

THE FIRST COOLER SHEP.—The bark Acadia, which arrived at Baltimore, Thursday, the 19th inst., reports species, no date, latitude or longitude, the brig Betsey Ames, Thursday, one hundred and sixty days from Hong Kong, with coolies for Charleston. There is probably some error in this report, as no information is known here in reference to this vessel. It may, however, prove true, and in that case, we can prepare a welcome for the first vessel with Chinese laborers. It may be that this brig may have been destined for some of the Cuban ports, and been ordered elsewhere in consequence of the unsettled state of that island. This cause may give us a supply of field hands at an earlier period than would otherwise have been taken place.

TAKING IN LANCASTER.—The Ledger has this budget of news: In some sections of this country there has been no rain for eight weeks. That not one-half of the colored people in this county pay any tax whatever. That there are more negroes sixty years old, than ever was heard of before.

That Governor Scott has appointed a minor to office in this county. That it is more than likely the Governor has been imposed upon in this instance. That a white Rad is shortly to be bound in the holy bands of "hemlock" with a negro girl.

READY FOR HIM.—On Sunday last, there appeared on the Charleston Hotel Register the following: "Charles G. Parker, Michigan." Shortly after the registry was made, a pers n applied to see Mr. Parker, who, fortunately, was out. This was the first of a series of applicants. All day yesterday people were inquiring if Mr. Parker was in. The clerk became tired of this and other questions regarding the movements of Mr. P., who was always out mad-one to two inquiries, and ascertained that the aforesaid gentleman was believed to be one of the firm of Parker & Brother, who have leased the Mills House, and these applicants desired to speak for a situation. There were applications from waiters, clerks, chambermaids, head clerks, &c. Mr. P. is still "out."

THE SICK TRANSPORT POOR.—Last night a cordoned copy of the number of the "sick transient poor," taken care of by the city during the year ending 10th of August, 1869, was sent to Governor Scott. The report shows that three hundred and eighty-five persons were taken care of at the Alms House, at a cost of \$9450; six hundred at the City Hospital, at a cost of \$11,800; twenty-seven at the Old Folk's Home, at a cost of \$380; five hundred and twelve at the Shiraz Dispensary, at a cost of \$1239; six hundred and fifty in Health District No. 4, at a cost of \$1560. Transportation was furnished to one hundred and ninety-two, at a cost of \$1187.

As some of these persons doubtless received assistance from two or more of the institutions named, the exact number provided for cannot be stated. The cost of sustaining them, and providing transportation for those who desired to leave the city, was about \$29,000.

CARMS.—The Lincoln Light Infantry (negroes), headed by a drum corps, paraded through the principal streets yesterday.

A negro woman recently had her husband put in jail for beating her, and then came near trying a dozen strokes running around her to get security to get him out.

Joseph Fryer and J. M. Stewart, colored, beat their wives and were sentenced by the Mayor, yesterday, to twenty days' imprisonment.

A crazy negro named Polly Anne Ore, was sent to the Old Folk's Home by the Mayor, yesterday.

Several parties were arraigned before the Mayor yesterday to answer the charge of selling liquor without license, and were all discharged.

Maria Montgomery, who was arrested on suspicion of robbing the kitchen of Mr. McKewen, was discharged yesterday.

An unknown negro, aged about forty years, and said to have come from Charleston to Savannah recently, was found dead in the latter city on Saturday last.

There will be a meeting of Council to-night. The investigation into the origin of the fire at the Stonewall engine house will be resumed at five o'clock this afternoon.

Council to-night will take action upon the petition of the cotton and rice factors to have the city tax upon rice and cotton removed.

It is reported that General John B. Dennis has been offered and declined the place of deputy collector of the port of Charleston.

John DeYaux assaulted his step-son, Wesley Fredman with a brick, and cut him on the head. DeYaux was bailed to appear at the next court.

The "Police bill," which provides for one hundred and twenty-five regular policemen (no "night watchmen") with two additional lieutenants, will probably be brought up in Council to-night.

DADDY CAIN'S INCREDIBLE EDITORIAL.—The Mazon papers make merry over the editorial of Daddy Cain's, republished in THE NEWS, warning the "Georgias Rowdies" to stay at home, because the South Carolina "his very like his former instructors and associates in life; he has a contempt of life when his rights are at stake, and whenever the Georgians wish to test their mettle they can find fifty thousand in this State who will gratify their ambition for a riot in five minutes." The Telegraph quotes the editorial with the following introduction: "Carolina is traditionally plucky; but we never realized before how deep the pluck went down till we picked up the 'Missionary Record,' the organ of the Charleston Ethnopathy, and also an expounder of the

"'Joseph Orthodox, Of apostolic blood and knocks."

"This organ of 'muscular Christianity,' so-called, is edited by one Cain, also of the best fighting blood of Africa, and a savage representative of one whose wretched biography is briefly set forth in the latest edition of Congo Catechism:

"Adam was the dearest man Eye had de addest: Cain was a wicked man 'Kase he stoned his rudder."

The article concludes as follows: "However, as a friend of peace, quiet habits and a protracted existence—as a man who would rather have, any day in the year, a good dinner in his stomach than an oncious going over into Carolina to fight this terrible Cain and his rioters. He is a regular Pilgrim Str. Kar derby. He has, like the old Pilgrim str. k, a double advantage in his fighting, for he bangs his adversary with spiritual and carnal weapons at once. He fights with Bible and revolver—with prayers and curses, and brings, as it were, the Father of Mercies and the Father of Mischief down upon a man at the same minute—which is too much. We hope the Angustians will be warned and let Cain alone. If Cain gets hold of them on his compound double-action principle, they will wish themselves on this side of the bridge and the drawer up. Let Cain alone. He's dangerous."
