THE WANTED CITY OFFICERS.

HEARING OF THE APPLICATION FOR MANDAMUS.

Decision of Chief Justice Moses.

The applications for mandamus and quo warranto writs, made on the 25th ultimo, in behalf of the relations, William N. Hughes, C. P. Frazer and P. C. Gaery, against the Mayor and Patrick J. Connor, Campin and Geo. Addison, for mandamus and quo warranto writs, against Martin Canfield for quo warranto writ, was heard before Chief Justice Moses at Sumner on Tuesday with Mr. H. D. Leece, and the respondents by Messrs. D. T. Corbin and R. S. Tharin.

The plea to the jurisdiction offered by Mr. Tharin on the 25th ult. was argued by that gentleman, and the decision reserved. After argument on the plea for mandamus, which was the motion in all the cases except that of Mr. Averill, four inspectors, the Chief Justice stated that since the first argument, he had looked carefully into the points made and the arguments quoted; that the affidavits, while stating that the relations, being officers of the corporation, had been ousted by force, did not affirm that those who ejected them were acting as officers de facto in the several offices, or stood in any other light than mere trespassers. That the mere forcible taking of the respective places of business did not oust the relations from their offices. That if they were, as claimed, officers de jure, they could still exercise their functions at any other location. That the affidavits made out no more than an obstruction or interference. He took occasion to express the opinion of the court to anything that looked like a resort to force or violence, and the efforts of the law, properly directed, would be strenuously interposed to prevent the results which would follow from an attempt to substitute force in the place of legal authority. The remedy sought did not apply, and the motion was refused.

The affidavits in the four inspectors' case was sufficient to authorize the writ claimed, to wit: Quo warranto, and it was accordingly ordered. The counsel for the relations stated that the affidavits could be submitted in the other cases, which would authorize the same writ against the respondents. It was agreed that on this being done, the argument for the quo warranto in all the cases would be heard on the 15th prox. The main point in issue will then be heard and decided.

The following is an extract from the opinion of the Chief Justice on the plea to the jurisdiction: A preliminary objection is interposed against the motion which, as it denies jurisdiction of the court in the matter before it, must be first determined. In the State, ex rel. South Carolina Railroad Company, vs. Columbia and Augusta Railroad Company, heard at January term, 1899, it was claimed on the part of the company that the State Court had not the power to grant a writ of prohibition, as the authority was exclusive, under the constitution, in the Criminal Court. The objection was not sustained, and referring to that decision, we will now inquire whether it was competent for one of the justices of the court to issue the writ. The point has been argued with ability by Mr. Tharin for the respondents, and it is due that the question should be fully examined. It is in effect argued that the 6th clause of the constitution of 1868, which organizes the Supreme Court (Stat. p. 72), which gives to each justice of that court power to issue writs of mandamus, quo warranto, and other remedies is inconsistent with the 15th section of the constitution, which is in the words following, &c.

The learned Judge proceeds at great length, adducing numerous authorities in support of his views, and concludes by overruling the plea.

With disheveled hair, loud shrieks and swaying of hands, she rushed towards the officer, who is a young unmarried man. He gave one frightened glance, and then fled the scene. In a short while he regained courage and went back. Being fully satisfied that she was crazy he had her dressed and carried her to the hospital.

SUDDEN DEATH OF MR. JAMES M. DURR.

Early yesterday morning the numerous friends of the gentleman whose name heads this article were startled by the report that he had been almost instantly killed by the discharge of a pistol.

This report, upon inquiry, and much to our regret, we ascertained to be correct. Coroner Whiting was notified, and summoned the following named gentlemen as jurors, and held an inquest: J. B. Cohen, H. W. Schroeder, Geo. L. Buiet, M. B. Wilbur, Warren Kinman, J. F. Seigniors, Joseph Cohen, J. Wilburn, L. King, P. Flynn, J. Campbell, Jr. J. Bosley. The testimony was substantially that the deceased, who was forty years of age and married, went into his brother's room, about six o'clock yesterday morning, and got a pistol, which he had promised to clean for him. He then returned into his own room, was there about a minute, when the pistol was heard to fall, and then was heard the report of its discharge. On rushing into the room deceased was found lying on the floor dying. A physician was sent for, but death ensued before his arrival. It was generally believed that the ball entered at the shin and came out under the left eye.

The verdict of the jury was that "the deceased came to his death by the accidental discharge of a pistol while examining the same, said pistol having fallen on the floor, on the morning of the 25th of August, 1899."

WASHINGTON COLLEGE, VIRGINIA.—A LIBERAL OFFER.—Yesterday Mr. J. D. Parry, president of the Typographical Union of Charleston, received the following letter:

WASHINGTON COLLEGE, LEXINGTON, VA., August 19, 1899.

To the President of the Typographical Union, Charleston, S. C.: Dear Sir:—The Faculty of Washington College are authorized to appoint to free scholarships a certain number of young men who intend to make journalism their profession. These scholarships include tuition and all college charges, and are of the value of about \$100 per annum. The appointments are for two years. A condition is attached that the student shall labor one hour per day, if required, in the line of his profession, the intention being to give him clerical, typographical or other his routine useful to him. The college makes no provision for the board of the pupil, owing to the fact that he will be employed in the line of his profession. A catalogue is mailed herewith, giving details as to the college.

The candidate should be over fifteen years of age, of good moral character, and able to enter the lowest class in three schools of the college. Please give this as early attention as convenient, as college opens September 16.

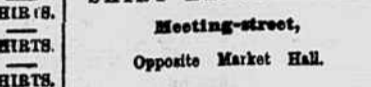
