HEARING OF THE APPLICATION FOR MANDAMUS.

Decision of Chief Justice Moses.

The applications for mandamus and quo parranto writs, made on the 28th ultimo, in chalf of the relators. William N. Hughes, C. P. Frazer and P. C. Guerry, against the Mayor and Patrick J. Coogan. — Camplin and Geo. Addison, for mandamus, and of C. N. Averill, relator, against Martin Caulfield for quo warrunto, was heard before Chief Justice Moses at lumter on Tuesday with the following result:

The relators were represented by Mr. H. D. Lesesne, and the respondents by Messrs. D. T. Corbin and R. S. Tharin. The plea to the jurisdiction offered by Mr.

Tharin on the 30th ult. was argued by that entleman, and the decision reserved. After argument on the rule for mandamus

which was the motion in all the cases except that of Mr. Averill, flour inspector, the Chief Justice stated that since the first argument. he had looked carefully into the points mad and the arguments quoted; that the affidavits, while stating that the relators, being officers of the corporation, had been ousted by force, did not affirm that those who ejected them were acting as officers de facto in the several offices, or stood in any other light than mere trespassers. That the mere forceable taking of the respective places of business did not oust the relators from their offices. That I they were, as claimed, officers de jure, they ould still exercise their functions at any other osstion. That the affidavite made out no more than an obstruction or interference. He tool coasion to express the opposition of the court to anything that looked like a resort to force or violence, and the efforts of the law, properly directed, would be strenuously interposed to prevent the results which would follow from an attempt to substitute force in the place of legal authority. The remedy sought did not apply,
