#### Deep Water.

The Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, to whom was referred the subject of examining the Beach or Sullivan's Island Channel, report that the greater part of the channel shows a mean low water depth of over thirteen feet, and that with some little dredging this channel can easily be made the safest and shortest entrance and outlet to the port of Charleston. The committee recommend that application be made to the Treasury Department to have a survey made, and an estimate taken of the expense of dredging the channel and of removing the wrecks which lie in it, so that Congress may be memoralized for an appropriation to cover the whole expense. Such a memorial, supported as it would be by the whole State, would doubtless be successful, but, as the memorial cannot be presented until the cost of the work to be dene is ascertained, it seems to us that it would be better to apply to City Council to have the necessary surveys made at once, at the expense of the city. Red tape in the departments would cause a long delay, and Congress might have adjourned before the survey was com pleted. If, however, the work be put in hand at once by the city, we shall within a short time know what it will cost to obtain and maintain a depth of twenty feet at high water in the Beach Channel. And, in this connection, it has suggested itself to us that it-will not be well to confine the survey to one channel only. The greatest depth of water expected to be obtained in the Beach Chan mel is about twenty feet. This must do, i we cannot do better; but it seems to us that the Main Ship Channel, also, should be carefully surveyed for the purpose of ascertaining whether we cannot have at that point as much as twenty five feet of water. At the same time, detailed information might be obtained from Europe cencerning

the charactered done in English ports, a work to which deepening our channel to twenty five feet would be a bagatelle. In this way we should be dealing with hard facts, and should have before us the records of what others have done under circum stances more embarrassing than our own We have not been able, so far, to give this but, it appears to us, the wisest course is to begin the survey without delay, to have both the Main Ship Channel and the Beach Channel surveyed, and to obtain from Eu rope all the information in regard to similar undertakings which is in any way acces sible. The expense will not be great, and if we venture nothing we cannot win the

### high prizes in the mighty game of commerce A New Material for Paper.

Some very interesting experiments have been in progress at the Cickassabogue Paper Mills, near Mobile, as we learn from the Mobile Register, under the direct supervision of Dr. J B Reed, of Tuscalooss, well known as the inventor of the Reed Shell which has rendered the Parrott gun so effective an engine of destruction in war fare. Several years since, when the cos and scarcity of rags rendered it important to discover some material which might be substituted in whole or in part for rags was the subject of much thought and investigation, the idea occurred to this gentleman that the okra plant, belonging to the family of the cotton plant, and containing a good deal of excellent fibre, might be advantageously used in the manufacture of paper. With him, to think was to act, and he at once commenced a series of experiments with a view to subject the theory to a practical test. Obtaining a small boiler, capable of bearing a considerable steam pressure, and gathering a few stalks as they were left in his garden, he c mmenced his work with the patience, labor and perseversace which seem to belong in a high degree to inventors, and are essential to their

SUCCESS. The experiments thus far made demonstrated the fact that good brown paper could be made of okra; but it remained to show that this material could be bleached to sufficient whiteness to make it available for princing or book papers, and if so, at what cost in comparison with rag or other material To decide by actual test, tois important question was the object of the investigation at the Chickassabogue Mills o which we have referred. The experiments were concluded, and the result is .minently gratifying to those engaged in tnem, and is of particular interest to the press, dealers in and manufacturers of paper generally, and to farmers and g rdeners in the South within reasonable distances of paper mills. In the opinion of the experienced paper makers who watched the progress of the work from the cutting of the dry stalks of okra to the production of

paper from the machine, the following

the entire plant is available from the root to the pod.

2 It is easily boiled, if well cured, reuires only time to reduce it, and may be washed and beaten ready for the machine in about half the time required for preparing rag stock, thus largely increasing the productive capacity of the mill without additional machinery.

3. When properly boiled it yields readily to the action of chemicals and can be bleached at no greater expense than ordinary

4. The pulp works as freely and smoothly on the machine as any other fibre-does not stick to metallic press rolls like straw and wood, even when working pure okra pulp, dries readily, and can be run safely at the highest speed of the machine.

5. The paper made here from it is very strong, tough and elastic-better in these respects, when made entirely of okra, than either straw or wood pulp when mixed with fity per cent. or more with rags. It has none of the brittleness and hardness so obectionable in straw papers, and may be ubjected to strong friction by rubbing between the thumb and fingers, or between the hands, and will open out smoothly and oft as a glove.

6. It will make an excellent substitute to mix with other fibres in the beating engines, and is of itself a superior hand stock

7. Whether worked pure or mixed with ags it makes a paper entirely free from the objection justly raised by the printer against straw and wood papers. 8. It makes an excellent stock for fine

wrapping paper, and imitation Manilla paper, and even in its raw state, without boiling or bleaching, makes a strong article of common wrapping paper, suitable for grocers and hardware use-superior to any paper made of straw. The grand result will be the cheapening

of paper to consumers, and it ought to be the transfer of paper manufacturing mainly to the South, where this fibre is so readily and chearly grown.

We may add that the Chicksesabogue Paper Mills, near Mobile, are now advertis ing for okra stalks, and will purchase 1200 tons of that material if it can be furnished.
