CHARLESTON.

WEDNESDAY MORNING, SEPT. 1, 1869.

WE PRINT, this morning, an elaborate review of the trade and commerce of Charleston for the year ending yesterday. This review has been prepared with care, and will confirm the confidence felt by our people in the latent power of the State. With chearfulness and reasonable hope do we enter upon another business year. We have the promise of a fine crep of the fleecy staple, our business facilities are improving daily, and, as well as man can judge, we have before us a harvest of prosperity that will amply repay us for all the toils and all the embarrassments of the last few years.

The Commercial New Year.

On this the first day of the commercial new year, we may again glance at the change wrought in the position of the South since September 1, 1868. Then the Southern country had about seen the worst. The condition of affairs was not as it was a year before, and, making the most of the little they had gained, our people were determined to keep a stout heart in the future. This has enabled them to fight down the despondency which would naturally be excited by a practical experience of the follies and crimes of Radical State administrations; and if the South to-day is hopeful and undaunted, it is because we trust ourselves, and are confident that the rule of ignorance and fraud cannot endure much longer.

One striking feature of the Southern industrial situation is the opening of Northern eyes to the importance of the cotton, tobacco and sugar crops of the South. Upon these grons the United States mainly de pend for the maintenance of the national credit. The twelve cotton States alone can save the country from financial ruin. The products of the North and West are the same as those of Europe, and can only be exported with profit to supply a deficiency in the foreign production. Specie is largely exported to meet the interest on the Uni ted States debt and to pay for excessive importations of foreign goods; but the mines of California and all the hoarded treasures of the East and West would be insufficient to square our accounts with Eu rope, were it not for the gold power of sugar, tobacco and cotton. These products have always a specie value; they represent so much nard money drawn from Southern soil by Southern capital and labor. We do not take into account the shipment of tonds to Europe for sale as a source of revenue That is nothing more than paying one debt by creating another, a process which can not be indefinitely continued I he time will come when Europe will be charv of lending more money to the American Union. and then, more than ever, will the North

and West be dependent on the South. A comparison of the exports of the two sections, the North and the South, makes the power and wealth of the South at once apparent. The exports of the North and West for the year ending July 1, 1870, with probably reach \$200 000 000, for a population of about 28,000 000, or \$7 15 for each person. (For the year ending June 80, 1867, the exports, exclusive of cotton and its manufactures, were: Animal produc tions \$32 575 115, bread-ruff. \$40 983 168 wood and its products \$17 076 878. miscel laneous \$31 429 783 Total \$122 004 989 The exports of the twelve conton States for the year ending July 1, 1870, will certainly smount to \$250,000 000 for a population of 11 000 000 or about \$22 78 for each in dividual. Here we have an export of \$7 15 per copita from the North and West, against \$22 73 per capita in the South, the export of the South being more than three times the export of the North and West.

Turning to South Carolina, we find that she holds an enviable position, in one par ticular at least, among her sister States South Carolina in the year ending July 1, 1870, will probably export cotton, rice and other products to the value of \$80,000 000 which, with a population of about 670 000. will give an average of \$44 78 for each in dividual, which is a x times greater than the average of the States outside of the cotton belt. It may, therefore, be assumed that this State has within her greater elements of true prosperity than can be found in the North or West. In order that these elements of prosperity may be turned to the heat account, we must have labor and capital Labor we have; but it is insufficient in quanity and uncertain in character. White immi-

working strength, and the Chinaman, whese queue will soon be familiar in every district, will, by competition, keep the freedman to his work and wean him from the idea that megroes can live on politics alone. Capital we are accumulating every day. This capital is timid and does not seek immediate investment; but the planters, unable to invest money in negroes, and unwilling to buy m re land, will in the end be forced to devote their capital to improving their plantations, buying stocks, building railroads and factories, and to encouraging other enterprises of an industrial character. This will give life to the State, and every man will receive his share of the general prosperity. In addition to our home capital, we expect to obtain capital from the North. Next winter the Northern capitalists will turn their eyes toward South Carolina; for we can offer them opportunities of making noney which cannot be surpassed. Besides the crops of this State, there are

other sources of wealth which require only

development. We have two vast beds of kaolin clay, one on the South Carolina Railroad, the other on the banks of the Santee River. This clay is very pure and capable of being manufactured into the finest crockery, while we import the latter from the North and Europe. In several sections the buhr stone abounds, of the best quality; but thus far it has been allowed to remain unmolested, while we get our grindstones from New England. Our phosphate interests are rapidly becoming of great importance, and will be great sources of wealth to the State; but, thus far, their true importance has been more shrewdly perceived at the North than by the majority of eur own capitalists at home. Our people are fast appreciating the good effects resulting from manufacturing our cotton at home, and we now have twice as many factories at work as were in existence three years ago. All of them are supplied with the latest style of machinery, and can excel the best managed mills of New Hagland, as our people have their cotton on the spot, and have no additional charges of freight and stealage to pay. All that is requisite is earnest enterprise, to make our cotton goods drive from our market the fabrics of New England. . The water power of the State is abundant, and three bold and deep rivers traverse her entire length. She has 10,000,000 acres of land covered with as fine lumber as this continent produces True, we are now under the rule of thieves and negroes. An adventurer, unknown for any good, but known too well for evil, now occupies the chair once graced by John Laurens, Wm. Henry Drayton and John Rutledge. A convicted thief and forger, and suspected incendiary and mur derer, now stands where Langdon Cheves and William Lowndes once stood. We par ticularly realize the degradation of our State, when we compare the characters of the men who now rule us with those of the noble men who formed this government, and gave South Carolina ner honorable posi tion. But this forced degradation cannot and will not last. Rascality, like all other dogs, has its day, and the next general election will hurl from power the rogues and put in their places honest and respon sible men. Then, indeed, will there be glorious future for South Carolina.
