EFFECTS OF THE DECUTH IN GEORGIA.-The Augusta Chronicle and Sentinel says: "For several weeks past this section of the State has been visited by a long continued and very severe drouth. What have been its effects on the cotton in some localities will be best sh wn by the following circumstance, which has been related to us by the best authority: On the plantation of Colonel H. D. D. Mackey read a petition from a large number of merchants, praying Council to remove the tax upon rice and cotton, and gave notice that at the next meeting of Council he would introduce an ordinance providing for the removal of the objectionable tax. The petition was received as information,

and further consideration postponed until the next meeting.


