NEW YORK, September 18—THE MARKET.—In our last report the market closed strady at 34c for midding uplands. Saturday, prices were easier under more liberal offerings to arrive; sales 969 at 33% 386c. Mönday, the market was depressed and irregular; sales 676 at 33a3% for middling uplands. Tuesday, there was increased pressure to sall, and rices were lower and irregular; sales 1063 bales at 32c. Wednesday, there was a very unsettled feeling, and holders, not being ab e to sell on the spot, sald for delivery all this month, as low as 29c for low middling; sales 1142 bales at 30% for middling. Thursday, prices were %c lower, and, as the Liverpool news was a little better, buyers operated with more freedom; sales 2049 bales at 30c. Yesterday, the market for spot cotton was active, and as the amount ready for immediate shipment was small, prices were firmer; sales 3237 bales at 30% c.

During the week prices have fallen four cents, closing steadily at 30% c, with some demand and very little cotton ready for immediate delivery. Octon to arrive this month (only twelve days of) is offered freely at 28% c, basis of low middling. Planters are annious to realize, and spinners and exporters do not come in freely as yet. There is a great demand for currency to move the crop from all the ports and interior markets, and our nerchants find it almost impossible to find small bills to send.

Seaturnoal Position—In our circular of Au tist 13, we alluded to the dedicency of cotton in sight as compared with 1888, which stood at 450,761 bales on 6th August. To day our tables show only 225 664 bales less, in visible supply, and we feel sure that in November next there will be more cotton in sight than last year. The price of middling Orleans avera, et in Liverpool, last November, about 11d. and the question may naturally arise in the minds of spinners. Wy should cotton range higher than 11d. with as much or more cotton in the markets of the world and a larget prospective supply?

Acrino of English spineers and Allenican Spinners.—It is interesting to note the different methods taken I y the American and English spinners and manufacturers to get out of the difficulties caused by te high prices of cotton. In Manchoster, we see that meetings are held, speeches mide, and resolutions adopted, calling for parliamentary investigation into the causes of the depression. In the meantime, the mills are kept running and a surplus of goods are forced on an unwilling market. Our spinners, seeing that too many goods were being made, put their mills on half time generally, and their position has been improved by a decline in cotton of five cents, while goods sell (simply because less are being made) at exactly the same rates to-day as when




