THE "GEORGETOWN LINE." The steamer Eunie, long and popularly known to the Georgetown trade, has been temporarily withdrawn from the line, and will be furnished with a new boiler, and be refitted generally with the utmost dispatch.

THE CASE OF MAGISTRATE BRUCE was called before Magistrate Barnaux and DeLargo yesterday. Messrs. Tharin and Schroder appeared as counsel for the accused, and argued that under the circumstances, the case should be tried before a jury, and not before magistrates.

THE WASHINGTON LIGHT INFANTRY MONUMENT.—The Washington Light Infantry Charitable Association will, at their meeting this evening, adopt a plan for the monument they are about to erect to the memory of their deceased comrades, who fell in the late war.

ACCIDENT ON THE SAVANNAH AND CHARLESTON RAILROAD.—On Monday last a box and flat car on this road were thrown from the track near Whitehall Station, about forty miles from the city.

SINGULAR BIRTH OF NATURE.—A lady living on Shepherd-street, fifteen days ago gave birth to a healthy babe, and day before yesterday gave birth to another. She was unusually sick after her first confinement, and is now doing well. The babies are also in fine health and spirits.

CAUSES.—The quarantine hospital is nearly completed. There are eight lunatics in charge of the city officers at present. The fines imposed by the Mayor yesterday amounted to one hundred and fifty dollars.

MEETING OF COUNCIL.

A regular meeting of the City Council was held last evening, at which were present the Mayor, Aldermen Geddings, T. J. Mackey, Voigt, Barrow, Cunningham, Greene, Potter, Collins, White, Small, E. P. Wall, Howard, Holloway, L. F. Wall, colored.

The Aldermen were summoned to meet at six o'clock. The Mayor did not take his seat until seven o'clock, and the meeting was not called to order until quarter-past seven o'clock. The minutes of the last regular and extra meetings were read and confirmed.

PETITIONS. Petition of Mr. Ahrens was referred to Committee on Buildings. Petition of J. B. Doecher was referred to Committee on Licenses.

PETITIONS. Petition of T. H. Hoffman was referred to Committee on Licenses. Petition of J. A. Quackenbush was referred to Committee on Licenses.

PETITIONS. Petition of H. Hastedt was referred to Committee on Licenses. Petition of Jeffords & Co. was referred to Committee on Licenses.

PETITIONS. Petition of Wigger & Wiers was referred to Committee on Licenses. Petition of sundry citizens, praying that the present assessment of their lots be reduced, was referred to Committee on Assessments.

PETITIONS. Petition of S. Mooney was referred to Committee on Streets. Petition of United Fire Company, colored, praying that the city should allow them to have Engine No. 6 repaired at the expense of the city, or sold by the city to the company, was read.

PETITIONS. After some discussion, during which Alderman T. J. Mackey said that the Board of Firemasters had, in their mode of complying with the recent ordinance, seen fit to treat the Council with perfect contempt, it was ordered that the whole matter be referred to the Mayor and Alderman T. J. Mackey, to make up of the engine.

PETITIONS. Petition of William Bradford was referred to Committee on Betterment and Relief. Petition of Alexander Robinson, to be appointed inspector of naval stores, was read, and after a discussion three-quarters of an hour long, it was ordered that the petition be granted and the Mayor instructed to appoint him. Aldermen Collins, Cunningham, Geddings, Greene, Holloway, Howard, Potter, Small, Voigt, L. F. Wall, E. P. Wall, voting in the affirmative; Barrow, Mackey, Mayor, negative.

PETITIONS. Petition of Managers of Election, during the last election, asking that they be paid for the time they were in attendance as witnesses during the municipal contest, was referred to the Committee on Betterment and Relief.

REPORTS. Favorable report upon the petition of A. F. Stelling was accepted. Favorable report upon the petition of Mr. J. Irvine was accepted.

REPORTS. Favorable report upon the petition of H. Erenburg was accepted. Favorable report upon the petition of W. R. Dehone, relative to his dwelling house, was accepted, but the petition to build a kitchen was refused.

A communication from Steiner & Sherman was referred to Committee on City Lands. A communication from Dr. Leiby informing Council that the Lunatic Asylum had been transferred to him, and that upon examination of the Roper Hospital he found it needed repairs, and requesting that the repairs be made at once, was read and the report referred to the Committee on Public Buildings with power to act.

REPORTS. A report of the harbor-master stating that on the 11th instant, he had taken charge of the schooner Arch, and removed it to a place of safety, was read and referred to the Committee on Betterment and Relief.

REPORTS. The select committee appointed to investigate the charges against the city engineer requested Council to allow them to employ an engineer and a stenographer at the expense of the city, which request was granted.

A communication from a number of colored men requesting Council to grant them about three acres of land lying near the intersection of Line-street and Rutledge-avenue to build a grammar school upon, was read. [The particulars of this proposed school have already been given by THE NEWS.] The petition was received as information.

BILLS. The ordinance to appraise the rateable property of the city was formally ratified. Alderman T. J. Mackey presented a bill providing that Council grant a certain tract of land to W. A. Grant and others to build a grammar school upon. It was ordered to be printed.

On motion of Alderman T. J. Mackey, Council, at half-past nine o'clock, adjourned.

THE POLICE BILL.—It is yet waiting for CLARIFICATION.—In yesterday's News we fervently expressed the hope that the Police bill would receive final action last night. But it was not brought up nor even mentioned. The bill, as amended and printed, was laying upon the desk of each member, but no one made any reference to it. The "general" of this bill glared uneasily at the phalanx before him, composed of Aldermen Geddings, Voigt, Potter, Cunningham, Collins, and Small, colored, who seemed to be anxiously waiting for the introduction of the bill only for the purpose of springing upon it and tearing it to pieces.

Alderman Barrow stood by as principal aid to the "general." Aldermen Greene, L. F. and E. P. Wall, Howard and Holloway, (last four colored), appeared totally uninterested, and whether they would have aided in the assault upon the bill or protected it is yet to be known. Matters stood thus until half-past nine o'clock; all of the petitions, reports, &c., had been acted upon. At this hour, amid breathless excitement, the "general" arose and said, "Mr. Mayor: I now move"—(the opponents of the bill bawling that he intended to move its second reading, moved up by their mouths a large stock of ammunition—"lay-upon-the-table" round shot, "indefinitely postpone" shell and "adjoin" musket balls, ready to hurl them into the face of the "general" as soon as he opened upon them with the bill)—but he had seen that there was no chance, as some of his supporters were absent,—"and after a long pause, continued—"that this Council adjourn." And it did.

We are glad to announce that there was such a decided opposition evinced to the Police Bill, and that it may now be considered defunct. The "general" had better summon his clan and bury it. It will be seen by the votes of the colored Aldermen, and also that it was the intention of the framers of the bill to have discharged from the force all the Conservative members; and to do this, without placing the Mayor under the necessity of discharging them and thus creating a great deal of confusion and trouble, a clause was provided to meet the case.

The bill, as amended, provides that the "police force shall consist of one captain, two lieutenants, two sergeants, twelve roundsmen, and seventy-six privates or policemen, all of whom shall be, day and night, at the command and in the service of the city;" and that it "shall always be composed, as nearly as practicable, of one-half colored citizens and one-half white citizens of the City of Charleston."

That "the captain and lieutenants shall be nominated by the Mayor, and elected by Council. Said officers may be suspended by the Mayor for cause, which suspension shall be subject to the action of Council, and all other members of the police force shall be appointed and discharged by the Mayor, who shall in all cases furnish the appointee with a warrant of appointment; Provided, that each applicant for an appointment shall be well recommended by a member of the existing police organization, who shall not have received, within five days after the ratification of this ordinance, a warrant of appointment from the Mayor, shall thereupon cease to be a member of the police force of the City of Charleston."

The Inspection of Timber. EDITOR RIVER, September 18. In your issue of the 11th, I saw a communication signed T. J. Mackey, Inspector-General of Timber and Lumber, undertaking "to notice certain errors in your correspondence regarding his article on the 'Timber' which I have failed to see any errors that he has shown, except in regard to the date of the 'act,' on the other hand, he has 'fallen into' such gross errors that it would hardly be necessary for me to notice them were it not that my silence might be misconstrued.

If, as he contends, the office of inspector-general, &c., is the same, except in name, as that of inspector and surveyor, which is the necessity of an ordinance of the City Council to create such an office; and it is not plain to every one except he, who expects to derive the emoluments of such an office, that the City Council has "needed its authority" when the act provides that these inspectors, &c., "shall be elected annually," and the ordinance that "the inspector-general shall be elected regularly every two years."

He says that the ordinance violates also the act of 1856, reducing the fees to eight cents per thousand feet. In this he is again in error. "Now, if he had seen section 9 of the act of 1856," in connection with that of 1857, which says, "it shall be the duty of the surveyor and inspector to measure all timber in the manner aforesaid, brought for sale to the City of Charleston, at the request of the owner, and shall give a receipt for the same, and shall give a certificate of kind and quantity, &c.," he might have readily seen that everything is required to be done under the "act" that he undertakes to subvert, in justification of the ordinance (or, possibly, of the act of 1857), and that eight cents per thousand feet is the fee for it all. At that price, with the addition of classifying and marking, the office is much more remunerative, to the inspector, than the present timber sold in the city, as I have known the measurers to often make eight and ten dollars in two hours, and there is no cutter, with his team included, that can make that in the same space of time. The price of timber sold in the city is about one-third of what is usually given to the laborer for squaring and heaving the same timber, to be too much to bear.

The "act" does not require timber to be classified or marked, and the probabilities are that such an office might act injuriously to either the cutter or seller, if it should be filled, as most are at present, with unqualified persons. It is not clear to me that the ordinance has seen a few defects, at least, in the ordinance, if not in the "title of the office or fees authorized to be charged," though he is very much mistaken in saying that "with the exception of the few defects stated, the ordinance gives general satisfaction to the timber cutter." Now, I live among the cutters and have conversed freely with numbers of them on the subject, and I have to say to you that I have never seen a cutter, or one who does not consider it an imposition and assumption of authority, unwarranted by the existing "acts" on the subject.

A more rigid and just measurement, and a proportionate fee, would be for the benefit of the city, and the proper authority, which I am not to be objected to; until that is done, I will not present inspectors, &c., will have some trouble in collecting their bills for over eight cents per thousand feet, notwithstanding Mr. Mackey would have us believe that thirty cents in the aggregate was three cents lower per thousand feet, than they have ever been, or in other words, that the eight cents usually paid, for what kind of an arithmetical calculation, this conclusion is arrived at, I am unable to comprehend.
