Officers Lovett and McLemore arresting officers THE POLICE BILL-IT IS YET WAITING FOR CLANSMEN .- In yesterday's NEWS we fervently expressed the hope that the Police bill would receive final action last night. But it was not brought up nor even mentioned. The bill, as amended and printed, was laying upon the desk of each member, but no one made any reference to it. The "general" of this bill glared uneasily at the phalanx before him, omposed of Aldermen Geddings, Voigt, Potter, Cunningham, Collins, and Small, colored, who seemed to be anxionaly waiting for the introduction of the bill only for the purpose of pringing upon it and tearing it to pieces. Alderman Barrow stood by as principal aid to the "general." Aldermen Greene, L. F. and E. P. Wall, Howard and Holloway, (last four colored,) appeared totally uninterested, and whether they would have aided in the assault upon the bill or protected it is yet to be known. Matters stood thus until half-past nine o'clock; all of the petitions, reports, &c., had been acted upon. At this hour, amid breathless exciteaent, the "general" arose and said, "Mr. Mayor: I now move"-(the opponents of the police bill thinking he intended to move its econd reading, moved up to their mouths a large stock of ammunition - 'lay-upon-theable' round shot, 'indefinitely - postpone' shell and 'adjourn' musket balls, ready to hurl them into the face of the "general" as soon as he opened upon them with the bill)-but he had seen that there was no chance, as some of his supporters were absent,"-and after a long pause, continued-"that this Council adjourn."

And it did. We are glad to announce that there was such decided opposition evinced to the Police Bill, and that it may now be considered defunct. The "general" had better summon his clansmen and bury it. It will be seen by the following that there was a strong bid for the votes of the colored Aldermon, and also that it was the intention of the framers of the bill to have discharged from the force all the Conservative members; and to do this, without lacing the Mayor under the necessity of discharging them and thus creating a great dea

of confusion and trouble, a clause was provided to meet the case. The bill, as amended, provides that the "police force shall consist of one captain, two lieutenants, two sergeants, twelve roundsmen, and eventy-six privates or policemen, all of whom shall be, day and night, at the command and in the service of the city;" and that it "shall always be composed, as nearly as practicable, of one-half colored citizens and one-half white citizens of the City of Charleston."

That "the captain and lieutenants shall be nominated by the Mayor, and elected by Council. Said officers may be suspended by the Mayor for cause, which suspension shall be ubject to the action of Council, and all other members of the police force shall be appointed and discharged by the Mayor, who shall in all cases furnish the appointee with a warrant of appointment; Provided, that each applicant for an appointment shall be well recommended by a member of the City Council; and any member of the existing police organization, who shall not have received, within five days after the ratification of this ordinance, a war rant of appointment from the Mayor, shall thereupon cease to be a member of the police

EDISTO RIVER. September 18. TO THE FUTIOR OF THE NEWS. In your issue of the 11th, I see a communi-cation signed T. J. Mackey, Inspector-General of Timber and Lumber, undertaking "to no-tice certain errors in which your correspond-ent, 'Justitia,' has fallen into," &c. After perusing his article carefully, I must say that I have failed to see any errors that he has shown, except in regard to the date of the "act;" ou the other hand, he has "fallen into" such gross errors that it would hardly be ne-cessary for me to notice them were it not that

cessary for me to notice them were it not that my silence might be misconstrued. If, as he contends, the office of inspectorgeneral. &c., is the same, except in name, as that of inspector and surveyor, where is the necessity of an ordinance of the City Council to create such an office? and is it not plain to to create such an office? and is it not plain to every one except he, who expects to derive the emoluments of such an office, that the City Council has "exceeded its authority," when the act provides that these inspectors, &c., "shall be elected annually," and the ordinance that "the inspector-general shall be elected re-models ensure two Nears." "Biall be elected allight, and the order have that "the inspector-general shall be elected re-gularly every two years." He says that your correspondent turther alloces that the ordinance violates also the act of 1856, reducing the fees to eight cents per thousand feet. In this he is again in error, &c. Now, if he had taken "section 8 of the act of 1855," in connection with that of 1856, (which says, "it shall be the duty of the surveyor and inspector to measure all timber in the manner aforesaid, brought for sale to the City of Charleston, at the request of any person own-ing or buying the same, and shall give a cer-tificate to such person specifying the quality and kind and quantity, &c.,") he might have readily seen that everything is required to be done under the "act" that be uniertakes to subdivide, in j...diffcation of the ordinance (ex-cept classifying and marking) and that eight subdivide, in j______ification of the ordinate (ox-cept classifying and marking) and that eight cents per thousand feet is the fee for it all. At that price, with the addition of classifying and marking, the office is much more remune-rative, to the inspector, than the profits on timber sold is to the cutter; as I have known the measurers to often mate eight and ten dollars in two hours, and there is no cutter. with his team included, that can make that amount in the same space of time; then to ount in the same space of time; then to amount in the same space of time; then to raise it to thirty cents per thousand feet, about one-third of what is usually given to the labor-ers for squaring and hewing the same timber, would be too much to bear. The "act" does not require timber to be classified or marked, and the probabilities are that such an office might act injuriously to either the cutter or seller, if it should be filled, as nost are at present, with unqualified persons I am glad to see that Mr. Mackey has seen I am glad to see that Mr. Mackey has seen a few defects, at least. in the ordinance, if not in the "title of the office or fees authorized to be charged;" though he is very much mis-taken in saying that "with the exception of the defects cited, the ordinance gives general satistaction to the timber catter." Now, I live among the cutters and have conversed free-ly with numbers of them on the subject, and I have the first one to find yet, who approves of it, or who does not consider it an imposi-tion and assumption of authority, unwarranted by the existing "acts" on the subject. A more rigid and just measurement, and a proportionate incr ase of the fees therofor, enacted by the proper authority, will not be objected to; until that is done, I think the present inspectors, &c., will have some trouble in collecting their bills tor over eight cents per thousand feet, notwitstanding Mr. Mackey would have us bolieve that thirty cents in the would have us believe that thirty ceuts in the aggregate was three cepts lower per thousand feet, than they have ever been, or, in other words, than the eight cents usually paid. By what kind of an arithmetical calculation this conclusion is arrived at, I am unable to com-prehend. JUSTITIA.



THAT RADICAL LAWYEB .- George A. Nancy failed to make a case against the "atorney at law," and he was discharged; but the attorney acknowledged that he had received one hundred and fifty dollars from the young man, and gave seventy-five dollars to Nancy; paid twenty-five dollars to Magistrate Bunch to go upon a bond, and fifteen dollars to some one else to do the same thing and kept the remainder, thirty-five dollars, for his professional services. Nancy had paid him ten dollars at the start, to conduct the case for

her. Any way the case is looked at it shows badly for Richmond, and the members of the bar should certainly do, as it is said they willmove to have his name stricken from the honorable roll of attorneys.


