THE COTTON CROP IN NORTH CAROLINA. The Wilmington Journal says: "We have before referred to the probable short crop of cotton in this State, and we regret extremely to learn, from a source in which we have confidence, that the crop of Robeson county will only yield about one-half of what it was pitched for. The late cotton is opening badly, and the rot is very perceptible, and adds greatly to the shortness and quality of the crop."

THE WORKINGMEN'S ASSOCIATION.—The Committee of three from each of the trades who were appointed by the chairman (Mr. James M. Rabb), met last Saturday evening, at the South Carolina Hall, and presented a draft of the constitution, which was accepted. The meeting was private, but we are sincerely glad to hear that the association has purged itself of the political element that was manipulating it. A public meeting of the workingmen will be called at an early day.

STEVEDORES' PROTECTIVE UNION.—The stevedores of this city, following the example set by the longshoremen, have formed a union to protect their interests and those of the shippers. They have pledged themselves to the latter that the work shall be done thoroughly and expeditiously, and without the aid of men who have made themselves obnoxious by their dictatorial proceedings. The shippers, we are told, will accord the new organization their entire support. The first meeting of this union was held on Friday evening, and was presided over by Captain A. O. Stone. The constitution was read and adopted, and arrangements made to perfect the workings of the Union. A special meeting will be held this evening at the hall of the Hook and Ladder Company, No. 1, in Queen street.

THE ACADEMY OF MUSIC.—Mr. John T. Ford, the enterprising lessee of our little jewel of a theatre, arrived in the city on Saturday, and expressed his unqualified gratification at the arrangement, capacity and adornment of the new temple of music and the drama to be inaugurated under his auspices. Mr. Ford assures us that he means at all hazards to maintain the social character of the Academy, both before and behind the footlights. The entertainments that he intends to present will, in all cases, be the very best of their class, and at once pleasing and refined. The Chapman Sisters, the stars who are to open the Academy, have won golden opinions wherever they have appeared, and we are sure that our people will be delighted by their sparkling and vivacious performances.

Mr. Ford has secured for the opening night a program specially written for the occasion by Wm. Gilmore Simms, Esq. The finishing touches are now being put to the ornamental work of the Academy, and by the middle of this week it is expected that the structure will be substantially complete. The gorgeous "sunlight" which is to illuminate the interior has been elevated to its position in the dome, and the complicated details of the scenic arrangements are rapidly approaching perfection.

Our friends in the country who may chance to visit Charleston in December, or in fact any time this winter, need have no fear that first class amusements will be lacking to make their evenings on the city pass pleasantly away.

THE MASONIC FAIR.—Saturday night ended the first week of the Fair, and the hall having been previously engaged by the minstrels, the managers were reluctantly compelled to suspend operations. A number of articles are still on hand, and the chances are not all taken in several of the most important raffish. It is, therefore, proposed to obtain on the lower hall and exhibit the same goods on one large stand. It would be difficult to secure takers for the remaining chances, and the articles still on hand would command a ready sale when offered at the low rates proposed. The Fair has been a complete success, and the receipts will fully equal the expectations of the Masonic fraternity. 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CHROMOS.—It was currently reported on the streets Saturday that the Grand Jury had found a true bill against ex-Alderman T. M. Mackey, for assault and battery with intent to kill. A meeting of the Union Republican party will be held this evening at the Military Hall. A grand pow-wow is expected. The new flooring in the upper wards market is nearly completed. The investigation into the East Bay fire failed to discover the cause. That of the fire in Calhoun street is still pending, though the testimony elicited thus far induces the belief that it was the act of an incendiary.

A SERIOUS MISHAP.—Some excitement was caused on Meeting street on Saturday morning by the appearance of fissures in the front of the new building occupied by Messrs. Cameron, Barkley & Co., at the corner of Meeting and Cumberland streets, and for a time there were fears that the wall would fall. The facts of the case, which our reporter has been at some trouble to ascertain, were as follows: The owners of the building wishing to deepen their cellar, with a view to meet the wants of their growing business, employed Mr. Culleton, a contractor, to do the work. He had made very fair progress in what he had undertaken, the side walls having been successfully underpinned by brick work some three feet below their original depth, and the sandy soil removed from the interior of the cellar to a corresponding extent. Coming to the front, however, the fatal mistake was made of undermining the entire width of the structure, leaving the immense mass of masonry of the front wall hanging from the two corners. The front, which is about forty feet wide, stood this fearful test for some time, and then gradually yielded, the masonry below the iron sills sinking into the cavity below. Then was presented the singular spectacle of the powerful iron columns, designed by the architect to support the wall, themselves supported solely by the bond of brick and mortar above them, acting like an immense arch. As soon as this state of affairs became apparent a large crowd collected around the building, and a messenger was dispatched to the distressed owners for Mr. John H. Devenny, an Academy of Music. With characteristic promptitude that gentleman speedily had a gang of workmen at hand, with as far as possible, the aid of all, to remedy, as far as possible, the accident. He soon succeeded in grasping, by a system of shoring, the entire front, not allowing another brick to fall, thus affording the owners an opportunity of removing their valuable stock from the part of the building endangered. We presume that the operations necessary to repair the damage will be continued to-day, Messrs. Cameron, Barkley & Co. meantime giving notice that the business of their establishment will be conducted through the rear entrance.
