

From a conversation with the party, we learn that the Annie left her dock at Williamsburg, N. Y., on Wednesday, December 29th, at half-past 10 Clawson. A. M. The United States Marshal and revenue officer examined the vessel carefully and gave her proper clearance papers, staying on board until the ropes were cast loose. Three of the crew left an hour after sailing. While rounding Cape Hatteras, on Saturday, the Annie encountered a terrible storm that drove her out of her course, and for forty hours no distance was made. As the coal was exhausted, it was determined to make the nearest port to obtain a supply, and Oharleston was sighted about 3 P. M. on Satur-

In the different searches that have been made on board the Annie since her arrival, it became evident that there was no armumant of any character concealed, and as the case has been placed in the hands of Messrs. J., asking the co-operation of this Board of Trade, to request our representatives in Congress to introduce a bill in the House for the establishment by the United States Government of lines of telegraph in all the States and Territories, to be employed by the government in combination with the Postoffice Department.
