A Word to the General Assembly.

Beaufort, or St. Helena Island, lies so remote from the routes of travel that the outside world know little of its decline and fall. The philanthropists who were ready to emancipate the negroes at a cost of nine thousand millions, according to Commissioner Wells, are not aware of the fact that the French ambassadors at London and Berlin in one section of South Carolina the ability of the freedman to improve or maintain his position has been thoroughly tested, with the most lamentable results. And the Congressmen who represent our State ignore a line of conduct, on the part of the officers of the government, which ruins the white man, and is rapidly reducing the negro to a condition of hopeless barbarism.

When St. Helena Island, or Beaufort, was evacuated in 1861, the freedmen became, at one bound, the possessors of houses, land, cattle, stock, and implements and farniture of all kinds. The old residents bad fled to the interior of the State, and their slaves squatted upon their teeming acres and occupied their luxurious homes. Without a farthing of cost the negroes obtained the use of property worth millions of dollars. Large bodies of Federal troops were quartered among them, spending money freely. They had every encouragement to be thrifty and industrious. In 1863, when the lands and homesteads of the absent proprietors were sold under the United States Direct Tax law, the freedmen bought at a nominal price, and upon highly accommodating terms, as many acres as they required. Their title might be considered good; for the Federal Government had then no notion of granting to the white man any justice which should, in appearance, injure the negro. Surely, no body of freedmen could have had a better opportunity of showing their capacity for moral and material elevation! The experiment

Before the war its people were wealthy; they made large crops; they paid considerable sums into the Treasury of the State; they did a heavy husiness with Charleston Now, the white people, the few that remain, are poor-their lands are of little worth, their crops are nothing. The white people have been rained, while the negroes rain themselves. The duty of the hour is as plain as our interest. For the good of the whole State, it is important that a colony of colored paupers should be changed into a thriving district. For the good of the taxpayers, this once wealthy section should be raised from the dust and enabled to share the common burden of taxation. For the good of the freedmen of St. Helena, they should have employment-steady employment-which will give them food, clothing and sheller for themselves and their families. This cannot be had without capital; and capital without experience, on our sea

islands, has proved of little value. What is wanted, it seems to us, is a return of the old planters to their old homos. The question of the validity of the land sales is before the United States District Court for South Carolina, and the decision of the stood forty million or dothas awaiting the beck Judge is anxiously awaited.
