The Sumter Monstrosity.

It is instructive to watch the many surprising anomalies of legislation and of jurisprudence in which the Radical mis-government of South Carolina is at present indulging, if it be only to convince us how easily the most sacred traditionary rights and privileges of a people can be travestied by unlegitimate humor in parody, but as the boundaries of humor and pathos so closely conjoin, we may perhaps be pardoned for losing sometimes our enjoyment of the grotesque aspect of this variegated legislation, in our deepening sense of its most outrageous and indecent wickedness.
