The XVth Amendment.

The XVth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States has been ratified by the required number of States, and the declaration that "the right of citizens of the United "States shall not be denied or abridged by "the United States or by any State, on ac-"count of race, color, or previous condition of "servitude; and that the Congress shall have "power to enforce this article by appropriate "legislation," will, as soon as the official announcement is made, stand as a part of the Federal Constitution. The States which have adopted the amendment are as follows: Alabama, Arkansas, Connecticut, Florida, Georgia, Iliinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Louisiana, Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Nevada, New Hampshire, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Vermont, Virginia, West Virginia and Wisconsin.

There are thirty-seven States in the Union, and twenty-eight have voted for the amendment. Of these twenty-eight, nine are Southern reconstructed States.
