A STRAMER PARTS HER CABLE AND DRIFTS TO SEA, WHERE SHE FOUNDERS .- The Savannah Advertiser of Sunday contains a statement of the particulars, so far as ascertained, of the loss at wo Roys, with 459 bales of cotton on board, she having been blown off by westerly gale after parting her cable, and is reported to have sunk about forty miles from land : The following are the facts in reference to the The following are the facts in reference to the misfortune to the steamer Two Boys: Sine arrived at Darien from Dublin on Monday night, the 7th instant, at 10 o'clock, with a cargo of 456 bales of upland cotton, everything being in good working order. The steamer took in two cerds of wood at Darien and departed for Savannah at 12 M. same day. The weather at the time was foggy—no wind or sea. On the following day, Tuesday, at 1:30 P. M., while crossing Sapelo Sound, near Black Bear Island, and about a mile from shore, the engineer notified the captain that the steam the engineer notified the captain that the steam-er would have to be stopped, as the nipple had been blown off the steam drum, and at the had been blown off the steam drum; and at the same time we observed a great escape of steam under the cabin floor. The captain ordered the steamer's head to be put towards the sea, when her rudder chain gave way. She was immediately anchored after this in three or five fathoms of water, no sea of any consequence running, wind blowing fresh from the west. While her rudder chain was being repaired, she dragged her anchor. More cable was given, which checked her. She again commenced dragging, and continued to do so until she was checked the second time, being stopped this time about two hundred feet from the shore. Her head was then turned towards the beach. enecked the second time, being stopped this time about two hundred feet from the shore. Her head was then turned towards the beach. About ten minutes after this her cable parted. Captain White then ordered myself, Pilot Bailey and others to jump overboard with a hawser, and, if possible, make it fast to the shore. She was then in about four feet of water. No means of securing the hawser could be found exc_pt to a log of drift wood, partially bound in the sound. This proved insufficient, and the steamer drifted of from the shore, due east, at the rate of about five knots an hour. The party on shore, consisting of F.
