A SOUTH CAROLINA RAT TRAP .- Mr. W. J. Clarkson, of this State, has invented a novel and very ingenious rat trap called the "Surprise for which he has obtained a patent, and is now making arrangements to have them manufactured. The price of rat poison will decline when Mr. Clarkson gets his machine in operation. As the rats can't read, we will describe it. The Surprise Trap is simply a rotary wheel placed over a suitable cage or other receptacle, the wheel is formed of four radial wings, and on each wing is a treadle to which the bait is attached; as soon as the treadle is touched the wheel revolves and deposits the rat or other animal in the cage below; the next wing is brought in position and so on until forty revolutions are performed. The trap is then wound up and is ready for action again.
