MEETING OF COUNCIL.

Corbin's Salary Increased—City Treasurer's Report—Police Bill, &c.

A regular meeting of the City Council was held last evening, at which were present the Mayor and Aldermen Greene, Barrow, Volz, Collins, Geddings, Cunningham, White, L. F. and E. P. Wall, Holloway, Thomas, Brown, Hampton, Small, McKinlay, Howard, colored.

Petition of James Riols was referred to the Committee on Public Lands. Petition of Mrs. C. H. Bernard was referred to the Committee on Brick and Wooden Buildings.

Petition of sundry citizens of John street was referred to the Committee on Streets. Petition of the Hibernian Society, asking that it be relieved from the city taxes assessed upon the hall and grounds of the society in 1869, was organized on the ground that it was managed for charitable purposes, and was referred to the Committee on Retrenchment and Relief, with instructions to confer with the City Attorney and ascertain whether or not the tax was legal.

Petition from the board of fire wardens, requesting payment of a bill of \$100 due to Messrs. Cameron & Barkley, was received as information.

Petition of Chamberlain & Seabrook, attorneys for Captain McFarrin, asking that he be reimbursed for the money he paid to Dr. Leiby and others, for medical attendance upon members of his crew who were sick with yellow fever, having been compelled to pay this because there was not sufficient quarantine accommodations for the crew; was referred to the city registrar with instructions to report at the next meeting of Council.

Petition of the corporators of the Enterprise Railroad Company, of this city, asking that the company be granted the right of way through the streets (heretofore mentioned), was referred to the Committee on Railroads.

Petition of John F. Griffin was referred to the Committee on Brick and Wooden Buildings and Steam Engines.

Petition from the Fire Department asking for an appropriation of \$200 a month for steam and \$100 a month for hand engines, was referred to the Committee on Fire Department, to report at the next meeting of Council.

Petition of the Ashley, Comestor and Prudence colored fire companies, asking that the first Tuesday in May be appointed for the inspection and parade of the colored companies, was referred to the Committee on Fire Department.

Petition of sundry dealers in timber and lumber, asking that no election be held for inspector of timber and lumber, as altogether a useless, inconvenient and annoying office; also asking that a committee be appointed to inquire into the subject, was received as information.

On motion of Alderman Collins, the Council proceeded to the election to fill the office of inspector general of timber and lumber, left vacant by the resignation of Alderman T. Mackey.

Alderman Collins nominated Alderman David Barrow. The result of the balloting was as follows: David Barrow received fourteen votes, and Alderman L. T. Potter one.

Alderman Volz submitted the following report of the city treasurer, and offered a resolution providing that the report be received as information, and those portions relating to the assets and indebtedness of the city, and the receipts and expenditures for the months of January and February last be published. Adopted.

The report of the City Treasurer, briefly is as follows: Amount of unpaid bills on the 1st of March, 1870, \$39,716 72. Amount of unpaid taxes up to 18th of March, 1870, 12,361 70.

Alderman McKelvey introduced a bill to amend the ordinance to aid in rebuilding the waste places of the city. It provides for the removal of all restrictions upon erecting wooden buildings. It received a first reading.

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AMUSEMENTS.

At the Academy of Music.

L'Oratorio is a favorite opera, although it has been hummed and strummed to death on every piano and hand organ in and out of civilization, and its announcement for last night drew to the Academy of Music an audience both large and fashionable.

Miss McCulloch, whose powers are better adapted to tragic than comic opera, acted and sang with vigor, and, especially in the last act, was fully equal to the requirements of the dramatic situation. The role of "Leonora" is an exacting one, but Miss McCulloch exerted herself to the utmost, and in the cavatina of the first act (Tea in the night) and the noble cavatina in the last act ("D'amor sulla roca") deservedly gained loud rounds of applause. It is to be remarked, however, that the audience more than once allowed the most meritorious efforts to pass unnoticed. This was the case with Miss Henne (Azucena), who has not the physical force necessary for a perfect realization of the character of the fierce gipsy, but whose dramatic intensity and pleasing vocalization made her, as a whole, the artistic triumph of the evening.

Signor Brignoli was a little careless in singing the serenade in the first act, but made ample amends by the tenderness and pathos of his "Ah sia ben mio," (which was not applauded as it deserved) as well as by the fire of his "Quella Pira," which was, indeed, splendidly sung. The last act was eagerly anticipated, and the passionate strains of the "A che la morte" awakened the house to active attention.

The moon on the tower slept soft as snow. And who has not thrilled in the strangest way, As we heard him sing, while the gas burned low, "Non ti scorderò." But Signor Brignoli, when in an unnamable mood, receives vigorous applause with the same mild-mannered placidity which awaits the passionate pleadings of the love-lorn Leonora, and the song was not repeated.

Signor Petrilli was a good "Conte de Luna," although a trifle lacking in repose. He sang "Il Balau" with much taste and fine effect, and proved himself throughout an actor as well as a singer.

The chorus, who there was of it, was very fair, and the *mise en scene* excellent—considering. Of course the *avvil chorus* amounted to nothing, but the three singing gipsies did their level best.

To-night will be performed Donizetti's *L'eroica* Borgia, and it will, doubtless, be finely given. The company is a good one, and, if the chorus and orchestra are not what they ought to be, it is only because a small Southern city cannot support a larger Italian Opera Troupe than the one we now have.

At the Hibernian Hall last night there was a very good house, to witness the Panorama of Ireland and the personations of Irish character. The pictures are very beautiful, admirably executed, and, we are informed by one who knows, absolutely true to nature. During the progress of the panorama, Mr. Jerry Conroy gives some remarkable exhibitions of the eccentricity of the Green Isle. His songs, dances and dramatic sketches are exceedingly amusing, and he holds over with the genuine spirit of the Emerald Isle.
